Holly Social Club has postponed their meeting which was to have taken place this evening until next Tuesday evening.

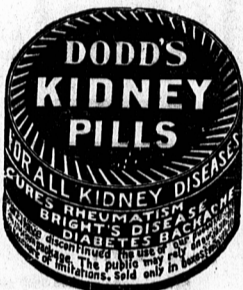

He came to Charlottetown by the mail special yesterday morning and went to Summerside in the afternoon.
