In the City Market yesterday pork sold at eight to nine cents per lb, hay pressed per ton nine dollars, hay loose per cwt. forty-five to forty-eight, white oats per bus forty-eight to fifty cents, black oats per bus fifty to fifty-three cents, butter per lb twenty-two to twenty-four cents, eggs per doz seventeen to eighteen cents, straw pressed per ton six dollars, and straw loose per cwt. twenty-five to thirty cents.
