At the meeting of the Maritime Board of Trade which will convene in the City next month a number of subjects of importance to the Maritime Provinces are listed for discussion. The topics especially relating to Prince Edward Island are the following: better inspection for Maritime Provinces; three ice-breaking steamers for winter service; steaming to assist sailing vessels through Grand River Bridge, proposed by the Alberton Board; the Charlottetown-Tatamagouche Bay route; freight and passenger rates between this Province and other points—proposed by the Charlottetown Board; and inspection of farm products offered for sale; withdrawal of third winter steamer.

There is probably no Province of Canada that offers such inducements to immigrants from the British Isles who have a small amount of money for investment as this Province and frequently inquiries come to the Dept. of Agriculture about the farms that are being offered for sale. There is now an immigration agent in the Old Country and he would like to be furnished with particulars regarding any farms that may be for sale. The trip of Scotch Agriculturalists last summer has done much to advertise our province and there is every likelihood that purchasers could be found in the British Isles for many farms that are being offered for sale.
