**THE LEGISLATURE.**

Promotion has come to two members of the Legislature. On Thursday last Dr. Douglas was appointed Deputy Speaker, and Mr. Hughes was sworn in as a member of the Executive Council, succeeding to the position vacated by Hon. John F. Whear. Both appointments, will, we think prove generally satisfactory and The Guardian extends congratulations to the two legislators thus promoted. Dr. Douglas, who has been a member of the Legislature since July, 1900, has made himself acquainted with parliamentary procedure, and while a strong party man, we believe he will exercise impartiality in the chair when called to fill it. Mr. Hughes was clearly entitled by prominence in and services to the Liberal party and to his constituency to the honor conferred upon him and we believe will prove himself a useful member of the Government.

Many regrets are felt and expressed for the absence through serious illness of Hon. R. C. McLeod, one of the most clear-headed and influential members of the House. And we doubt not, many on both sides of the House will regret the enforced retirement of H. J. Palmer, K. C. It is not a little singular that since the retirement of Messrs Whear and Palmer there are only three lawyers remaining in the Legislature, namely, Attorney General Peters on the ministerial side and Messrs Matheson and Morson on the Opposition benches. Nova Scotia has twelve lawyers, New Brunswick nine and British Columbia seven in service as provincial legislators.

It is said the reason why Mr. Currie as representative of the West River District has not taken his seat is because of a sale by him of some piling to the Government contractor for repairs on Rocky Point Wharf. Whether or not this constitutes a technical violation of the Independence of Parliament Act is a matter of dispute. Mr. Currie has, however, taken the safe side by so far refraining from sitting and voting. What he may do hereafter remains to be seen.

The London Times is very strong in its advocacy of Japan's cause and in its hopes of her success in the war. It contemplates the possibility of Port Arthur, Vladivostok and Korea all falling into Japanese hands, and then, it says, "The Dominion of Russia in the East is ended. Established at those points the Japanese can make themselves so strong, that so long as they retain control of the sea and hold their army in leash, they can consider their position impregnable." Few of us at this distance are so confident, but we must remember that The Times has very reliable and abundant sources of information as to the situation, the strength and preparations of the combatants. There is apparently little or no sympathy for Russia in Canada, and very little in any part of North America. If New World sympathy could decide the contest, Japan would be a speedy and decisive victor. But Russia is not yet defeated and it must prove a long and hard task to force her to a peace involving the sacrifice of her position and her ambition in the East.

**PROGRESS OF THE WAR.**

The battle of Chong Ju, reported in our despatches on Thursday last is noteworthy in several respects. It was the first land engagement worthy of note between the Russians and Japanese, and it serves to show the locality in which the vanguards of the opposing forces are, and near which other conflicts in the near future may be expected.

Chong Ju is a walled Korean City of some 40,000 inhabitants situated near Korea Bay, some sixty miles south-east of the mouth of the Yalu River, and a little farther by the main road northerly from Ping Yang. We may take it in that Chong Ju represents about the most advanced point of the Russian advance into Korea from the north, and also the limit of the Japanese march northward down to the time of the fight on March 28th.

We have at this writing only the Russian account of the fight, and it admits defeat for the Russian forces, also that it was a fierce fight in which the Japanese gallantly held their ground. The Russian retreat appears to have been made westward through Kasan to Noo San, the latter not being marked on the best maps yet available. When we receive the Japanese account we shall no doubt find that they are not a little elated over their victory in their first encounter with white troops, especially as they have since followed a good distance in pursuit.

On the day previous to the land fight at Chong Ju the renewed attempt to "bottle up" the harbor of Port Arthur was made by Vice Admiral Togo. The Russian account which came to hand first represented this as a complete failure. Admiral Togo's account is much more circumstantial and shows that three of the stone-laden ships made their way under very hot fire to the desired positions and were sunk there by their crews. The fourth also reached its intended position but was torpedoed by the Russians and so driven away to one side, leaving a passage way still open. But the entire operation, although not quite successful, was carried out with such coolness and courage as gives great promise for the future.
