ARMY RESERVE ORGANIZATION.

STOCKHOLM, Dec. 3.—The Swedish gen-
eral staff has completed plans for the or-
ganization of an army reserve. It has
divided the country into 155 districts, each
furnishing one battalion consisting of four
companies and containing a depot for
Mauser rifles. Peace exercises will be
confined to shooting. The newly organi-
zed army, including the reserves, will
number 400,000.
