He spoke at some length of the kingdom of the rising sun—of the climate, products, inhabitants, their characters, customs, etc. Although the country is so beauti- ful and the climate mild the atmosphere is not bracing. The people, with all their politeness, intelligence, activity, etc, are notably untruthful.
