High Cost Of Living

(Continued from Page One.)

The new crop of split peas is less than last year, and the opening price will be \$7.00 per bag of 98 pounds. There is a good crop of hay in the provinces, but prices seem to be erratic. Quotations today from country points show a cost of \$27.00 to \$28.00 by the car load delivered Halifax.

Boots and Shoes.

"Do you know that certain shoes have advanced \$2 a pair during the past fortnight?" said the sales manager of a well known manufacturing house. "The 'Merchant' had to admit that the information was news to him. 'Well,' he said, 'it is true, and what is still worse, I am afraid they haven't touched the blue sky yet. What shoes we are getting now were made from leather at a lower level than it is today, and what will happen therefore when the stock comes out that is being made from present day leather is not hard to estimate: it must be dearer still.' And then he went on to say that the men on the road were almost hysterical over the prospect that they would not be able to complete the round of their customers before their present selling prices were cancelled. When a shoe traveller sees a boy with a telegram coming his way he shivers until he has passed and every time the hotel clerk passes him a letter on his arrival it so unnerves him that he can scarcely sign his name on the register."

From the above it will be seen that whatever truth there may be in the prediction that furs will be cheaper before long there is nothing, or less than nothing, in the same belief about shoes. And particularly is this true of the better qualities. We were shown a man's boot this week at \$9.85 which no later than July last was jobbing at \$6.25. Of course there are still a few lines to be bought at \$4, but they are only brogans, have no style and wouldn't stand a few days of wet weather. Years ago when they were about half the present price or less there was a certain quantity of these shoes disposed of, quite a large quantity in fact; but of late nobody would buy them, the demand is for something more stylish and durable, and as the people have money it is something better they are bound to get. We shall probably need a period of hard times in this country before purchases of low grade shoes will be made in any quantity.

The trade complain about the difficulty to sell anything but the high cut boot to women; women refuse to look at the height of former days. This, of course, is most unfortunate at the present time, with leather so scarce, but it just can't be helped, for women will have their way.

Hardware.

Several price changes are reported this week. Both black and galvanized sheets have advanced 25 cents. Carriage bolts have been advanced by a reduction in the discounts. Mrs. Potts Sad Irons are up 10 cents per set.

Some kinds of fencing wire are higher, and some kinds of roofing paper have also been put up. Various kinds of Manila cordage have declined 1 cent per lb. Cordage is about the only item in the list that shows any downward tendency. The present movement having followed previous declines. Most other lines are either higher or higher. The conditions in the manufacturing trade seem to favor a strong market, both materials and labor being higher than ever.

Provisions.

There is general unsettlement in the provision market and prices have gone off considerably. The Board of Commerce has made a ruling whereby packers can only have a certain margin, regardless of the packers say, of whether it pays them or not. A modification of the order, however, has been issued, which will give the packers until the end of the month to adjust matters, and it is possible that by the time the market for hogs will be favorable enough to enable them to conform to the order without serious inconvenience. Prices quoted below are subject to change at any time; it is impossible at this writing to get a firm price. The likelihood is that prices will be lower still. Trading is not heavy. Everyone is buying from hand to mouth.

Butter, Cheese and Eggs.

The Montreal butter market last week advanced to 57 cents for fresh made creamery solids. If the local quotation followed closely, it would now be 62 cents for this grade. At present it is selling at from 57 cents to 58 cents, but no doubt if Western prices hold, the local market will move up in sympathy. The local make of creamery flats at present is hardly sufficient for requirements, and retail grocers are therefore buying more or less Ontario creamery in 1 pound blocks. While this butter is not as good as local creamery flats, the stores buy it for two reasons; one that they can't get a sufficient supply of flats; the other that the price is lower. The Ontario 1 pound block is cut from cold storage creamery solids.

The cheese market has firmed up locally on account of the high price in the West. While the cheese commission are paying only 25 cents, it is impossible for the trade to make purchases below 28c to 28½c. The Halifax local trade want nothing but colored twins, while the cheese commission will take large white cheese. Needless to say the colored twins take more labor, and the factory is also at a greater expense for coloring. The local trade have not yet called on their cold storage stocks of eggs, the receipts up to the present being large enough for requirements. The demand for eggs is said to be as large as when prices were lower. Prince Edward Island still continues to offer current receipts of fresh rather than old eggs sufficient to keep the local trade supplied. Most of these eggs are in good condition, though we have heard some complaints of stale stock, due no doubt to farmers having been tempted to hold their supplies too long in the hope that prices would still be higher. Receipts of Nova Scotia eggs at the present time are practically nil.

Dry Goods.

It is becoming increasingly difficult for neckwear manufacturers to secure satisfactory materials to take care of the orders that come to them from the trade. The manufacturers are reported to be withholding quotations for spring delivery, as they have about all they can do in handling the orders they have for assorting. There is some talk of relief coming with respect to the material supply, by the advent of French silks on the market, but how much the relief will amount to, of course, depends upon the quantity, but it is to be noted that large quantities will be required as American mills are reported to have cancelled old orders and to have taken on new orders at higher prices. The French silks are said to be more reasonable in price than offerings from other sources.

Higher prices have to be paid for immediate delivery is said to be as much as \$2.00 to \$3.00 per dozen in the case of domestic lines, and as much as \$6.00 a dozen in the case of imported goods. It is understood that hat manufacturers are now able to get their hats for fur at slightly lower prices, though they still have to pay high prices. Braids, ribbons and sweat

bands, on the other hand, are higher, tending to neutralize any advantage they may have in the case of other materials. Caps are high in price still and manufacturers still have to pay high prices for their materials and labor. The supply of caps is not adequate at the present time, but manufacturing conditions are improving and the prospects are that the supply situation will improve. Prices of clothing for next spring will be higher, for the conditions in

manufacturing do not improve, but rather have a tendency to become still more costly. It is very difficult indeed to get deliveries, but as merchants placed unusually generous orders they may find that with what they succeed in getting they will have sufficient to go around. Many of the clothing manufacturers are sending their travellers out a bit later than usual this year, because they have been so pressed with business that they have not had the opportunity to make up their next season's samples.

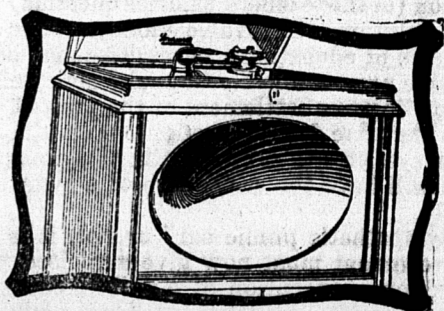
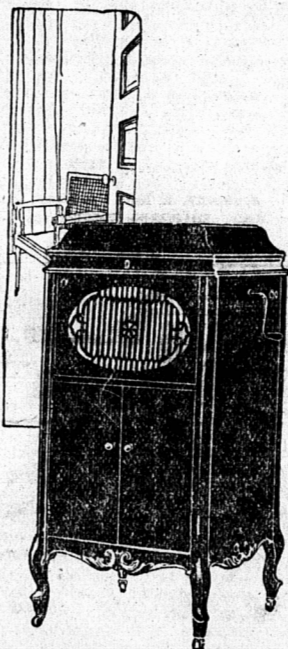

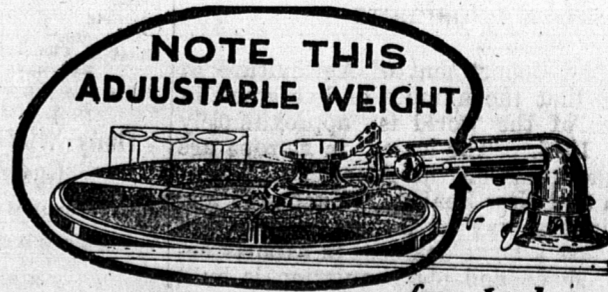
