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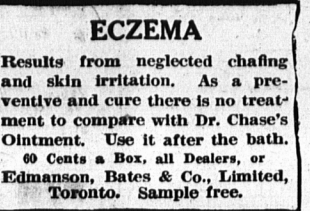

Lower Diggate, Shorncliffe, Eng. Aug. 27th.

Dear mother:—Just a few lines to let you know that I am well, and hope this will find you the same. We are getting along fine here, and having fine weather; just a couple of days' rain.

I was in London on pass for six days, and had a good time. It is a very nice place, with lots of nice things to see. The White Sister will be where we are camped, not far from town. We can go after hours, but have to be in by 10 o'clock. The country is nice around here and the farmers are harvesting the crops, which look good.

We are not drilled any harder than we were in Canada, with just the same hours a day, but we have quite a few marches, about 10 miles in the afternoon. We have Saturday afternoon off to go anywhere we like. We are still living in tents, but will soon be moving out of them into huts which will soon be ready for us. All the boys from around home are well, and like this all fine, and so do I. We see lots of aeroplanes flying around every day, and at night too, with lots of searchlights looking for Germans. Will Irving is well, and is going to write soon. We had a nice trip coming across on the boat, as it was smooth as oil, far smoother than M. Hb. is in a storm. There was nobody sea sick, and the Germans did not bother us, for they did not get a chance. We get lots to eat, which we enjoy.

Well, I guess I will close for this time. From your loving son,

My dear mother,—Just a line to let you know that we are well. I received your letter, and was glad to hear from you.

Well, we are having dandy weather now ever since we came to England until today. We are not having a bad time at all. I was up to London on pass, and had a great time. All the lads are well, and James is getting along fine, and was up to London too. Hooper is just the same and getting along fine. Will Irving is also well. Cameron Clow and I are sleeping in the same tent, while Jack Reid and Charlie McLeod are in another. We had a little raid the other night, but it did not amount to much.

Lockwood Gray was here to see us the other night, and he looks great. He is just the same. I thought all the lads were going to enlist after fishing, but I don't think there is many doing so.

Well, dear mother, I wish you could send me some tobacco soon, as we can't get it here. I will have to come to a close for this time, hoping to hear from you soon again. Good-bye, with love to all, from your loving son,

GOOD PRICE FOR HORSE.—A Game of Chance, 213, the champion pacing stallion of these provinces, has been sold to John H. Farnham, of Reading, for \$2,500, by his owner, Bert Lint, of Fredericton. The sale was made at Rochester last week where the Lint horses were racing. The price is the highest ever paid for a pacer owned in the maritime provinces, and is second only to the amount for which Baring, the Halifax trotter, owned by Boutellier and Edwards, was disposed of four years ago, which was \$4,000. A Game of Chance was purchased in Indiana a few years ago for \$1,050.

The third day of the Charlottetown Exhibition was brought to a conclusion yesterday in a blaze of glory and hot weather which would have done justice to the style of weather usually prevalent in the middle of July.

The gaily dressed throngs of ladies with their bright coats and sweaters made a very picturesque scene as they sauntered from place to place over the grounds. The midway as on the previous day was a scene of animation and everyone seemed to be enjoying themselves to the utmost.

Again the attendance was very large, there being about two hundred more people crowded on the grand stand than on Wednesday. The main gate receipts showed that one hundred fewer persons passed through. The judges had a busy day of it and covered a large section of the list.

Great interest centred in the horse races and all were very keenly contested. Today is the closing day of the Fair the balance of the exhibits not judged will be completed and the animals and all other exhibits will gradually be moved away. The fakirs like the Arabs will move their tents and will (not quite so silently) steal away.

THE RACES.
The Free-For-All trot and pace yesterday proved the best exhibition of speed ever witnessed in the Province. Bob Mac the Island born pacer was picked to win but the imported pacer La Copia owned by P. A. Belliveau, Moncton was too strong and fast although Bob gave him the race of his life. The first heat was reeled off in the remarkably fast time of 2:13 1/2, reducing the track record by two seconds made by the British Soldier on the previous day. The second heat was in 2:15 and the third heat was a real horse race. Bob Mac endeavored to take the pole from La Copia from the word "go." He forced the stallion to the half in 1:04 (one of the fastest halves ever paced in the Lower Provinces) and the mile ended in 2:13 1/2. Hilda S., and Sister Patch were not far in the rear and made another race for third and fourth money. Hilda S., outfooted her western rival by capturing third position in the first two heats.

2:27 CLASS TROT (STAKE.)
This race was another exciting one from start to finish, and the time made was splendid. Brage the Halifax entry won the race but had to step the third heat in 2:18 1/2 to beat Brenton H. In the second heat Brage went to a break on the home stretch, the only error he made, and Keltie won the heat in 2:20 flat. Keltie won second money and Brenton H., third.

THE 2:30 CLASS.
This race proved one of the best of the meeting. Little Smoke 2:18 1/2 was the winner but had to keep going the whole way to ward off. The Abegweit, who finished at his saddle in the first heat. Lillian Patchen in the second and Queen Catherine in the final round. The Abegweit's showing was a marked difference from the previous day and had his knee boots not fallen down would have stood a good chance to take the measure of his Halifax opponent. Queen Catherine went a splendid race as also did Lillian Patchen. The best time was 2:18 1/2.

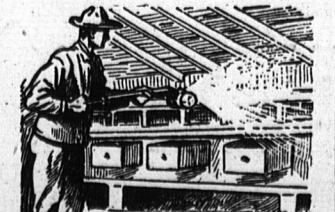
