DOWN THE BACK STRETCH

Mr. McElwain 1.59 1/4 is said to be the leading sire of new 2.10 performers for this season.

Both the trotting and pacing track records fell at the Danbury, Conn. Fair, one of the greatest fall festivals in the eastern United States.

The track pacing record was lowered on the opening day of the meeting when Betty Signal won the first heat of the 2.07 Pace in 2.05 1/4.

A pleasing feature of the meeting was the victories of Fred Pickle, one of the oldest Canadian teamsters, who won the first race on the program with Lee Brewer and also won the final race of the meeting with the Canadian owned trotter Calumet Kane.

Here are some of the outstanding performances of the above race meet. Miss Volodale (3) by Abbedale, won the 2.15 Pace in straight heats, best time 2.07 1/4.

Walter Candler, the Cocco-Cola man, spent a fortune endeavoring to breed winners and while he was engaged in that enterprise he had rather meagre success.

One of the most remarkable trotters of the year is Brer Rabbit 2.02 1/4, who broke into the limelight last April by being the first trotter to enter the 2.10 list.

At Lexington a full sister, the pacing mare Miss Meadows, took a record of 2.02 1/4. She was also bred by Mr. Candler.

The sweet little pacing mare Estrella 2.03, met with a serious injury at Shelby, N. C., two weeks ago which will probably result in her being destroyed.

Anna Bradford (3) 2.00 1/4, holder of the world's record for three-year-old pacing fillies for more than twenty years, last week gained credit with her eighth and ninth 2.10 performers, these being Athlone Bradford (3) 2.08 1/4 and Anna Bradford's Athlone (2) 2.06 1/4.

Anna Bradford was the sensation of 1914 when she swept the Grand Circuit, not meeting with a single defeat in the hands of Tommy Murphy.

As a five-year-old she won five races and then retired with a record of 1.59 1/4 and one of the most remarkable series of accomplishments to be found in the annals of harness racing.

It was Tommy Murphy who likewise campaigned this daughter, Anna Bradford (3) 2.00 1/4 for Fred F. Field, then President of the Brockton Fair.

Two campaigners that have done exceptionally well this season are Senator Lock with a winning record of 2.04 1/4 over a half-mile track and Miss Volodale (3) 2.04 1/4. They have won quite a number of races in the fastest and toughest company, showing unusual qualities of endurance and ability to carry speed.

A very serious fire took place during the St. Joseph's County Fair at Centerville, Michigan, when two sections of the race stables were destroyed and damages to the extent of \$15,000 occurred.

Although the Italians are very busy in Bologna yet they do not let that interfere with their harness racing at home.

At the Berlin trotting race meeting on September 25th Mrs. Therese Aska of Vienna, won the amateur event beating a dozen male drivers with the trotter Xenophon.

At Gesena, Italy, September 22nd, the ex-American trotter Muscletone 2.02 1/4, established a new world's race record for a half-mile track by trotting 1.739 metres at a rate of 1:16.7, which means 2.03 1/4 for the English mile.

Racing will get under way at Dufferin Park, Toronto, three weeks from today and will be conducted through to January second. It is expected that the greatest number of horses that has been stabled there for six or seven years including several American stables, will be on hand.

With the racing season practically over in Canada elsewhere, it is found that Leslie Patch 2.08 1/4, owned by A. L. Chambers of Milton, Ontario, and trained and raced by his son, has the honor of being the largest race winner in Canada.

Perhaps the pacer most highly regarded of this season's performers in Canada is one we made reference to before in these columns. Governor Gratian (4) 2.08 1/4, bred and owned by the veteran breeder Charles Barrett, Park Hill, Ontario. He was never raced before this season and only trained in 2.16 as a three-year-old.

Over 150 harness race meetings were held in Ontario in 1935 and the interest in that form of sport seems greater than at any time since 1912.

It is rumored that Orin Jardine will leave for Dufferin Park, Toronto, shortly where he will be connected with the stable of Robbie Isnor in which is Patrick Direct 2.07 1/4 and Quaker Girl 2.13.

Helene Mayer To Compete In German Olympics

(A.P. By Guardian's Special Wire) BERLIN, Oct. 25.—Helene Mayer, famous German-Jewish woman fencer, has accepted an invitation to compete for Germany in the 1936 Olympics at Berlin.

He displayed the following cable from California, signed only with the letter "H". "Sickness delayed answering you and Tschammer (Hans Von Tschammer-Osten, German sports commissioner.) Acceptance left yesterday. Love."

Lewald, himself of Jewish extraction, regarded the cablegram as disposing of at least one point in the Olympic squabble, revolving about alleged Nazi discrimination against Jewish athletes.

Miss Mayer, who has lived in California for several years, won the Olympic fencing championship at Los Angeles in 1932.

10,000 SEE HOCKEY GAME AT WEMBLEY

Greatest Hockey Season In England's History Getting Underway — Nicklin Is Impressed With Calibre of Teams.

(C. P. by Guardian's Special Wire) LONDON, Oct. 25.—The greatest hockey season in England's history is getting underway with more Canadian players than ever before on hand and plans being advanced for new and bigger and better rinks throughout the country.

Standard of play has improved year by year, as more Canadians came here to play under the British Ice Hockey Association, but the 1935-36 season will give British fans the best ice entertainment they have ever had.

At Brighton, a "Sports Dome" is being built to seat 4,000 and to house the Brighton Tigers. Plans are well advanced for rinks in other parts of the country.

One of them, Fred Monkford, intends to build a new one in southeast London to seat 12,000. He is to visit Canada and the United States to study plans of the big National League arenas in Toronto, New York, Montreal, Detroit and Chicago.
