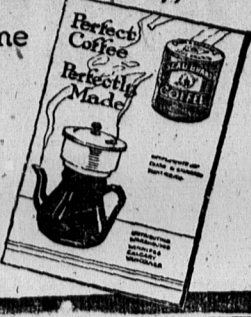

ON THE MARCH WITH THE CANADIANS.

The following letter has been received from Lieut. B. A. Dorion to his brother Mr. Alphonse, Dorion of Mayfield, Lieut. Dorion went over with the 105th Battalion:—
Belgium, Nov. 22, 1918.

MY DEAR ALPHONSE,—Although I have no letter from you to answer I will write you and try and tell you of the things which are happening in my part of the world. The newspapers no doubt give you quite a lot of news, and those I shall not mention.

As you know we are on our way to Rhineland. Yesterday we marched twelve miles and to-day we are halted all day. We usually march a day or so and then rest a couple of days so you see it is not very strenuous. The reason for this is to give the Hun time to agree to the terms of the armistice in giving up his guns, ammunition, aeroplanes, etc. Another reason he cannot go as fast as we can for his horses are absolutely all in.

It seems nothing remains but the skin and bones. Everywhere the Belgian civilians tell us that our horses look fine compared to those of the Boche. They are certainly feeling very fit and never fail.

This will certainly be a very eventful march. We go into many historical places. For instance we went through Mons and I had the pleasure of spending an afternoon there. Of course it was the Canadians who took Mons but not our division. We were on rest at the time. At the present time we are almost direct south of Brussels but not near enough to see it. We are also not very far from the famous battlefield of Waterloo I wish I could go and see it but time does not permit.

Things are much the same here as they were in the occupied portions of France but I do not think the Hun was quite so severe. The people seem to have fraternised more than the French people.

You know that Belgium has always been famous for its draft horses. Well, nothing remains of them now. He has taken (I mean the Hun) all the stallions and working horses. There is hardly a horse over two years old left in the place. We have gone through a rich agricultural part and everywhere the former has to use colts of eighteen months.

I suppose this is enough for this rubbish. Do not know yet when we shall be home but a great deal depends in the next two weeks and also on the authorities in Canada. I am ready to go at any time now.

Xmas is drawing near and it will be another one spent away from home but no doubt we shall be all together for the next one. I do not think I can send any gifts this year unless I am fortunate enough to see something on my way. I

hope to be able to bring you all something when I go.

JOHN A. MCAULAY

The sudden death of John A. McAulay at St. Peters on Tuesday day last, was the saddest ever occurred in the village. Deceased was forty-one years old, having been in the employ of Mrs. Nathaniel Thayer of Boston and Lancaster for the past eighteen years in the capacity of butler.

Six years ago he married Mary L., daughter of John R. and Mrs. Malone of Freetown, P. E. I., who with deceased mother came to live in the "old homestead" here one year and a half ago.

On the 9th inst. he arrived home to spend a short vacation with them intending to be back in Boston for the Christmas festivities. En route he contracted this fatal influenza but his condition was never considered serious until broncho-pneumonia developed, a specialist from the city was summoned, in conference with the attending physician, and pronounced the case hopeless. Near midnight on Tuesday he breathed his last. He was attended, during his illness by his pastor Rev. Alexander McAulay, who, was also with him when he died. His wife having contracted the disease was seriously ill at the time.

His funeral took place Wednesday evening, and as it slowly wended its way to the church nature, as if joining in the common sorrow from her clouds, dropped soft flakes of snow that fell on his casket like sprays from the hands of sorrowing friends. His many friends will always remember him as a genial, kind hearted citizen, his mother, as the best of sons, his wife, as a loving husband, his children, as a devoted father, and his sister, as a kind and considerate brother. God rest his soul.—R. I. P.
