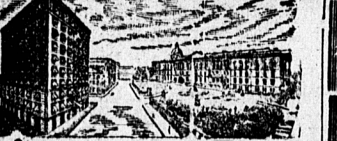

Campbell vs Storey, Time extended to move for new trial until July 15th.

John R. Dennis vs Benjamin Warrington action on notes. Verdict for plaintiff for \$148.45. W. E. Bentley for plaintiff.

The Page Wire Fence Co vs Hector A. McLean. Action on note. Verdict for plaintiff for \$35.22. W. E. Bentley for plaintiff.

At 5.20 p. m., the Grand Jury returned. They reported having found True Bills in the following criminal cases.

The King vs Joseph A. Shepard, burglary.

The King vs Ernest Davey, James J. Brien and Seymour Gregory, attempt to break and enter a shop.

The following is the report read by the foreman: To His Honor

The Chief Justice, The Grand Jury having visited the Asylum for the Insane, the Infirmary and the County Jail begs to report as follows:

In all these institutions they found extreme cleanliness, the Sanitary arrangements, ventilation and food being all that could be desired. The Asylum for the Insane, if not exactly overcrowded has certainly reached the limit of its capacity.

At the Jail the Grand Jury strongly to press the necessity for a telephone in the building. Emergencies may easily arise in which telephonic connection would be invaluable. The bars at the windows seem to be rather far apart and they are loosely set in mortar—they should be set securely, probably in lead.

The stairs leading to the upper stories are of wood and it seems to the Grand Jury that in the case of fire there would be serious danger to occupants of the upper stories. One at least of these stairways should be replaced by stone or iron.

A good fence is needed and it seems to the Grand Jury that if possible the services of the prisoners should be utilized to improve the grounds and as far as possible to raise supplies for the support of the institutions.

The Grand Jury present to the Court a serious case of nuisance in the Bunbury School District near the terminus of the Hillsboro Bridge. It appears that manure consisting largely of offal has been spread upon the land of Mr. W. A. Mutch without due regard to the conditions of public health or the comfort of the neighborhood. This presentation is made in the hope that your Lordship may see some way in which this nuisance may be prevented for the future.

From information before the Grand Jury it seems that this kind of manure can be handled in a way that does not necessitate any nuisance. It appears that the local board of Health and the Honourable the Attorney General have doubts about the powers they possess under the Public Health Act and that in consequence this matter has been referred to the Grand Jury.
