**Boys Camp At Canoe Cove**

Upwards of seventy boys and fifteen leaders will be at camp at the beautiful Y.M.C.A. camp site in Canoe Cove Monday. The camp, which is being conducted under the combined direction of the Maritime Religious Education Council and the Y.M.C.A. was opened yesterday afternoon and will continue till Wednesday, July 13th.

**Evangelistic Lecture At The Forum**

The address last night at the Prophetic Conference now being held in the Forum by Evangelist P. W. Johnston was concerning the "Four Great Beasts" Daniel 7: 1-8. It was stated that these peculiar monstrosities of nature were symbols of four great universal monarchies beginning with Babylon and followed by Medo-Persia, Greece, and Rome. Mr. Johnston explained the unnatural appendages on the beasts such as the wings, ten horns, four heads and such like, as seen by the prophet in his vision. Thus upon the wings of the lion which he said was a symbol of Babylon denoted the rapidity of its great and mighty conquests, the four heads on the leopard he said, signified the four divisions of the Grecian Empire at the death of Alexander the Great. The ten horns of the fourth beast symbolized the ten divisions into which imperial Rome was divided after its overthrow in 476 A.D. The evangelist went into details of his explanations of each of the symbols which could be appreciated only by listening to the lecture.

The evangelist elaborated considerably on the little horn that came up among the ten horns of the fourth beast. The prophet he stated said that the horn would pluck up three of the ten leaving only seven, and that since these horns represented the ten kingdoms into which Rome was divided that seven of these were therefore remaining on the European continent today. The horn kingdoms that were plucked up he said were the Ostrogoths, the Heruli and the Vandals who opposed the rise of the little horn. This little horn which he read in the prophecy had eyes like the eyes of a man and a mouth that spoke blasphemous against the Most High, would be guilty of persecuting the true church or people of God. This little horn power he explained would continue for 1260 years. This year this wicked apostate would continue for 1260 years. The power that dominated the world for the time of the Dark Ages he said, fulfills the specifications of the prophecy and would be the little horn he said for long alone to God.

The evangelist deplored the union of church and state; for he said this was responsible for all the persecutions, Let church and state be separate he urged, the state operating in its own legitimate sphere in dealing with civil matters only and the church in its own place in dealing with religion only. When the state interferes with religion, he said, it is interfering with the rights of the citizen. Mr. Johnston said, so therefore let them operate independently of each other as was God's intention regarding them, then everyone will enjoy the privilege of worshipping in freedom, and the state will be free to deal with the consciences of any man or body of men.

**Mayor Kennedy Stresses Benefits To Charlottetown Under Conservative Rule**

Generous Financial Assistance For Direct Relief And Unemployment Received From Bennett & MacMillan Governments.

A total of \$118,355.97 was received by the City of Charlottetown from the Federal and Provincial Governments in direct relief and unemployment relief payments during the years from 1931 to the present.

This was one of the striking statements made at the Conservative meeting in Charlottetown last night by His Worship Mayor Kennedy, who presided, and who conclusively proved the great benefits to citizens resulting from the administration of the Bennett and MacMillan governments.

"We are gathered here this evening," said His Worship in introducing the Conservative speakers, Premier MacMillan and Mr. W. A. Stewart, "for a two-fold purpose. The Premier will review the record of the provincial government and he will enunciate its platform and policy in the present election campaign.

"It would be well for me at this time to explain to you the treatment afforded our City during the years from 1931 to the present at the hands of the Provincial and Dominion governments.

We will take for instance direct relief in

Adding these two amounts together it gives us a grand total of \$118,355.97. This then is the money received from the governments through the City Council. Not to mention the large amounts that were expended in various ways, such as removal of clay from Exhibition Grounds, repairs to wharfs, Drill Shed, the pavements on Lower North River Road adjoining the City, the pavement across from Hillboro Bridge to Cross Roads and the work performed on the trans Canada highway besides work on the Provincial Building, Falconwood building, Prince of Wales College, also the new work that is now to start and for which the money has been voted, \$21,000 for Hillboro Bridge, Drill Hall and repairs to wharves.

I would like to ask you laborers, is this worth anything to you? I would like to ask the citizens of Charlottetown, is this worth anything? Just imagine the efforts the governments put forth in trying to furnish employment for the laborer and in spending the money wisely and efficiently. Contrast this if you will with the promises and the utterances of the opposition. They are deadily opposed to the working men. They claim they are going to reduce public expenditure, they are going to curtail public officials. Does this not then mean more unemployment.

**Catholic Action Rallies Held Yesterday At St. Peters Bay And Tignish**

The first Catholic action rallies in the Diocese of Charlottetown were held yesterday at St. Peter's Bay and at Tignish. The rally at St. Peter's was opened at 10 o'clock with Solemn High Mass celebrated by Rev. I. R. A. McDonald of Souris with Rev. A. L. Sinnott, Rollo Bay, as deacon, and Rev. J. McDonald, St. Columba, as sub-deacon. Present in the sanctuary were His Excellency Bishop O'Sullivan and all the clergy from Charlottetown and the eastern section of the province. The sermon for the occasion was preached by Rev. Dr. McMahon, rector of St. Dunstan's Basilica. A paper on "The Rural Family," its importance in the spiritual and temporal life of the nation, its corresponding responsibilities on the part of parents and children, modern dangers assailing it, was admirably presented by Mr. Daniel Mullin of St. Peter's. A discussion on the paper was led by Dr. R. J. McDonald and Mrs. McLellan.

At the sectional conference of men and women held at 1.15 a paper on "Rural Parish Activities" was read by Mr. Elishan McPhee and one on "Rural Child Health" was read at the women's conference by Mrs. Campbell of St. George's Parish. In the discussion which followed the reading of these papers many practical suggestions were brought forth.

After these sectional conferences a demonstration was given in the parish hall by the children of St. Peter's parish who are attending the vacation school of catechetics conducted by the Sisters of St. Martha. The children in their singing and dialogues reflected much credit on their teachers. Another general conference was held at 3.30 and the various resolutions of the day's deliberations were considered. Many of the men and women present took part in the discussions and His Excellency Bishop O'Sullivan gave the concluding address of the day.

At 5 o'clock Solemn Benediction was given by His Excellency Bishop O'Sullivan. Rev. L. P. Callaghan, St. Charles, Deacon; Rev. M. J. Rooney, Cardigan, Sub Deacon.

Meals were served on the grounds during the day by the people of St. Peter's Parish. A similar rally was held yesterday at Tignish, the sermon being delivered by Rt. Rev. G. J. McLellan, Vicar-General.
