Liberals Vote Solidly Against Discontinuance Of Daylight Saving Time

The House met at 11 a.m. Mr. E. H. Strong moved, seconded by Mr. McKenzié, that the House go into committee on the following resolution: "Whereas in the opinion of this Legislative Assembly at this time in Session, the interests of the people of this Province and in particular those engaged in agricultural pursuits would be best served by the discontinuance of "Daylight Saving Time" forthwith. Therefore His Majesty's dutiful and loyal subjects, the Legislative Assembly at this time in Session assembled, urge upon the Federal Government at Ottawa to discontinue Daylight Saving Time in the Province of Prince Edward Island from the 1st day of April, A.D. 1944." The motion was defeated on a straight party vote 17-9. Third reading was given to an Act respecting the distribution of estates of intestates and an Act to amend the Act respecting the War Risk Insurance Act, 1942, and the registration of deeds or mortgages so taken. It was reported agreed to. On motion of Hon. Mr. McGulgan the House went into committee with Mr. E. H. Strong in the chair on an Act to amend the Insurance Act. The promoter explained that the amendments were proposed by the superintendent of insurance and are in accord with proposals for uniformity of legislation throughout Canada. Section 1 deals with protection against loss or damage as defined in the War Risk Insurance Act, 1942, and interpreted by a federal order-in-council of Dec. 3, 1942. The promoter stated he was not familiar with the terms of the amendments or the order-in-council. Mr. McPhee called attention to the difficulty of legislating under such conditions, where the right to interpret and legislate is assumed by order-in-council of the Dominion Government. Hon. Mr. McGulgan conceded that the amendments were confusing, but he had been assured they were gone into fully by the superintendents of insurance. Mr. Heath Strong: "Why should we pass something that nobody knows anything about?" Mr. McGulgan: "It only applies in cases of war damage." After some further discussion the promoter said he had received word that an additional clause was to be added to the bill. The committee accordingly reported progress. On motion of Premier Jones the House went into committee with Mr. Hunter in the chair on an Act to amend an Act to provide for superannuation allowances for school teachers. It provides for the absence of teachers on active service, and was reported agreed to with amendment. On motion of Hon. Mr. McGulgan the House went into committee with Mr. Bernard in the chair on an Act respecting Juries and Jurors. The bill provides as an addition to section 14 of the Act: "If it appears that no bill of indictment is to be preferred to the Grand Jury at any regular or special sittings of the Court, and that attendance at such sittings would entail hardship or inconvenience for the grand jurors, the Chief Justice or the Judge assigned to preside at such sittings may, on the application of the Attorney-General, make an order dispensing with the attendance of the Grand Jury at such sittings; and the grand jurors, if already summoned to attend, shall be notified accordingly by the Sheriff. Provided that the attendance of a Grand Jury shall not be dispensed with at two successive regular sittings for the same County." Mr. Barbour said the amendment had particular reference to the sittings of the Court at Georgetown, where there was frequently no criminal docket. Mr. Heath Strong said he believed the Grand Jury could be dispensed with altogether. They

are only a bill of expense. Mr. Bell pointed out that witnesses in manslaughter cases must now appear before four tribunals, the coroner's jury, the Magistrate, the Grand Jury and the petit jury. He approved of abolishing the Grand Jury. Hon. Mr. Barbour: "Would you advocate doing away with the petit jury too?" Mr. Bell said he would be in favor of retaining the petit jury. Mr. E. H. Strong recalled that in one case alone the Grand Jury dealt with a criminal docket. He said he would be glad to see the costs to pay the expenses to Grand Juries for ten years to come. The leading men composing Grand Juries are of great assistance in the administration of justice in this Province, he maintained. Why abolish an institution that has been passed down to us since Magna Charta? Mr. Saville endorsed the last speaker's remarks. Hon. Mr. McGulgan said there were arguments on both sides. He was not prepared to say which way he would vote on that question. It was not proposed to go that far in this legislation, however. The bill was reported agreed to without amendment. The House resumed debate on the motion to go into Supply.
