MINERS ATTACK OFFICES OF COMPANY.

TRINIDAD, Colo., Oct. 30.—Violence among the striking miners in the Southern Colorado coal fields yesterday shifted from Ludlow and its immediate vicinity to Aguilar, six miles north. Possible federal complications were precipitated at the office of the South Western Fuel Company, where a battle was waged between strikers and a handful of mine guards. After defeating the guards and capturing the mine offices, in which the post office also is situated, the strikers are charged with having knocked over a stove, setting fire to the building, which was destroyed, together with the mail, money orders and money. Postmaster Arthur Samples said the mail had been rifled before the building was fired, as opened envelopes were found nearby by half burned.

After destroying the South Western offices, the miners went to the Empire mine and riddled the boiler house with bullets. No one was injured in either camp.

At the strikers' camp at Ludlow there was no display of rifles and revolvers. Monday and yesterday hundreds of men were gathered in the camp stockade all heavily armed.

The Colorado Nation Guards today established their camp on the outskirts of the city. No trouble occurred between the mine guards and strikers at Ludlow to-day. Mine guards and strikers at noon were given twenty-four hours to surrender their arms and ammunition to the state forces, and unless they comply, it is indicated that the troops will remain in quarters indefinitely.

COUNTING MONET BY THE MILLION.

NEW YORK, Oct. 30.—About 84 tons of gold which lies in the United States sub-treasury in Wall Street, guarded night and day by a small army of watchmen and a battery of machine guns, is being counted by nine men sent over from the Treasury Department at Washington. Between 25,000 and 30,000 tons of silver also is being counted, as well as several million dollars in bills, and a few tons of nickels and coppers. The task was begun Tuesday, and will keep nine skilled men busy for three weeks.

At the end of that time they are expected to inform Martin Vogel, assistant United States Treasurer in charge of the New York sub-treasury that he has \$171,103,280.12 of Government funds in his keeping. If they should report one dollar more or less than this amount there would be no rest until the cause of the discrepancy was discovered.

CREW LANDED FROM ABANDONED VESSEL.

THE LIZZARD, England, Oct. 30.—The crew of the American schooner Lottie Beard was landed here today from the British tank steamer, Sylvia. Captain Kendall of the Lottie Beard and his men having abandoned their vessel on October 15.

Captain Prouse, of the Sylvia, which left Port Arthur, Texas, on October 6 by way of Newport News for Sherness, England, picked up the shipwrecked crew, who had been compelled to abandon the Lottie Beard, while that vessel was making the voyage from New York to Augusta, Maine. The Beard was built at Fairhaven, Mass., in 1866. She hailed the port of New Bedford and was owned by O. E. Kendall. Her displacement was 288 tons.

THE SCOTSMEN PREDOMINATE.

WESTVILLE, October 30.—A striking feature about the local census taken here yesterday is the predominance of those of Scottish descent in spite of continued immigration from all over the world. The total population of the town is about 4,500. Of those who gave their nationality there are 2,715 Scottish, 995 English, 384 Irish, 153 French, 10 Jews, 12 Germans, 7 Dutch, 6 As-

syrians, 5 Danes, 4 Swedes and 3 Poles. Those whose nationality is not specified (of whom there are 126) divide amongst Scottish, English and Irish in about the above proportions as far as can be ascertained. There are a thousand children in the town between the ages of six and sixteen. Now that the names and ages of these have been secured at the hands of their parents an effort will be made to fully enforce the law in regard to school attendance.

RAG-TIME HYMNS

ST. JOHN, Nov. 1.—The Rev. W. J. Jack, pastor of the St. George's Presbyterian Church, Newcastle, is strongly in favor of synecopated hymn tunes. "Rag-time music has been taken up with avidity," he states, "and I do not see why it should not be applied to hymns. It is simple and inoffensive, and we have something like it in some of the new church hymns."
