CHARLOTTETOWN BOY'S TRAGIC DEATH IN N. S.

The sad news contained in despatches received in this city yesterday announcing the death in Lunenburg, N. S., of George W. youngest son of Geo. H. and Mrs. Toombs, City, has called forth the deep sympathy of the entire community for the bereaved parents and relatives.

His death under such tragic circumstances makes the affliction a doubly hard one to bear, and excites a keen feeling of sorrow among the many friends of the deceased and his grief-stricken family.

Accidental death is the most plausible theory, and this is prominently advanced in press despatches and the fact that a loaded revolver was a necessary property of banks for purposes of protection—the chances of an accidental discharge can be readily supposed.

A Lunenburg despatch to the Halifax Chronicle, referring to the unfortunate young man's death, says: "A few minutes after five o'clock this afternoon the community was shocked to hear that G. W. Toombs, ledger-keeper in the Bank of Montreal had in some mysterious way fatally shot himself. He was alone at the time in the teller's box, the accountant, H. W. Foban, being up stairs where the bank officials sleep, and on hearing the report of a firearm imagined that it was somewhere on the outside of the building, and he was not in a hurry coming down stairs."

WARSHIPS JOIN REBEL FORCES

In China and Amoy Hoists the Republican Flag

SHANGHAI, Nov. 14—(By Wire)—Thirteen vessels of the Imperial fleet went over to the revolutionists this morning.

One of the largest cruisers steamed up the river passed a settlement and dipped a white ensign in salute to the foreign warships. None of them responded.

It would appear as those the situation in China has reached its climax. Thoughtful and well-informed men of both sides are anxious for a settlement.

The extremists and ignorant masses are willing and anxious to continue the struggle for supremacy, even though it spells disruption and wholesale slaughter, which appears inevitable unless considerable concessions are made by both parties.

There is no disorder, shops remain open, and there is a general feeling of relief.

TRIPLE MURDER IN NEW YORK CITY

NEW YORK, November 13—Mrs. Mariolo Lofaro, her seven-year-old daughter, Rosie, and her mother, Mrs. Antonietta Selma, met death today at the hands of a murderer, who invaded the dark kitchen of their home in Brooklyn, accomplished his deed and left the bodies of his victims huddled about the bare table without a sign of any struggle.

The crime was committed with a revolver, each of the victims being shot through the forehead at close range.

FIRE AT BELLEVILLE

BELLEVILLE, Oct. 13—Fire about eleven o'clock last night destroyed a brick building belonging to the Kelley estate. The loss is estimated at \$20,000.

MAY APPEAL TO PRIVY COUNCIL

To Test Validity of the Ne Temere Decree

MONTREAL, Nov. 14—(By Wire)—Before the strongest Orange lodge in Quebec, R. W. Saunders, Rural Dean declared in favor of taking before the Privy Council a test case as to the validity of the Ne Temere Decree.

He said a Dominion statute was necessary to settle the question and if that was not forthcoming Protestants should band together to appeal to the Privy Council.

COMPERS TO AMERICAN FEDERATION

ATLANTA, Ga., November 13—President Samuel Compers, of the American Federation of Labor, in his report submitted today to the delegates of the 31st, annual convention predicted great changes in American methods of government, particularly with regard to political parties. He gave to the referendum, initiative and the recall unqualified endorsement of organized labor and declared that a real, representative democracy had never been known in the United States because of the general absence of these provisions.

Severe arraignment is made of so-called scientific management or efficiency system. The membership is placed at 1,750,000.

PREMIER WILL CONSULT WOMEN

The Manhood Suffrage Bill Leads Him to Relent

LONDON, Nov. 14—(By Wire)—Premier Asquith, who hitherto has refused to see delegations of the suffragists, has relented.

In view of the impending introduction of a manhood suffrage bill in the Commons Mr. Asquith has announced that he will see a deputation of Suffragettes on Nov. 21.

LEDCUE CHARGES TISSUE OF PERJURIES

QUEBEC, November 13—His Honor Judge Langelier, in the court of sessions this morning, dismissed the complaints against L. Letourneau, M. L. A., and Ed. Deypre, charged these two with having bribed Rene Ledue to resign his seat in Quebec East in the last general elections. As will be remembered both Letourneau and Deypre were accused with having offered Ledue the sum of \$5,000 and a government position with an income of \$1,500 a year. Judge Langelier dismissed the charges on the ground that the complaints were unfounded, and that there was no case for a jury. Ledue's story of having been given \$5,000 while under the influence of liquor was false, he said, since Ledue showed so much indignation at being bribed, why did he not redeem himself on the day following by turning the money, said the judge.

"By his keeping the money he, according to law, was guilty of the same crime as those whom he accused of bribing him."

Continuing Judge Langelier, concluded by stating that Ledue's evidence was a tissue of perjuries.

RIDPATH'S CONDITION STILL SERIOUS

TORONTO, November 13—For the first time in several days St. Michael's hospital reported this morning that there was no improvement in Bruce Ridpath's condition. "About the same" was the best news they could give, Ridpath still remains in the same semi-conscious state that he has been in for almost a week.

FROZEN TO DEATH

GREEN BAY, Wis., Nov. 13—Eugene Dewarzewski, 71 years old, was frozen to death on a country road while returning to his home yesterday. His body was found today.

BONAR LAW'S ELECTION.

LONDON, November 13—Another victory came today for the ubiquitous Scot, whose triumph in the new world, the American ambassador recently recorded in Edinburgh. Andrew Bonar Law was elected to the leadership of the unionists by the vote of Austen Chamberlain and Walter Long were dividing the party and each was reluctant to serve under the other.

The Unionist caucus at the Carleton Club today, carrying out the prearranged program, unanimously appointed A. Bonar Law leader of the party in the house of commons. Walter Long and J. A. Austen Chamberlain, who had suppressed their own aspirations in order to avoid a breach in the conservative and liberal-unionist groups in the party, respectively proposed and seconded the nomination, and as no other name was submitted the motion was adopted by acclamation.

Thus a Canadian bred Scot of Presbyterial ancestry wins the distinction of succeeding Mr. Balfour, and displaces the two English rivals, whose partisans were renewing their action fight over the parliament bill. It will be found a broadminded choice, a timely for the recent disclosure of Canadian loyalty.

Mr. Law lacks practical knowledge of the Irish question, and will not take a churchman's view either of disestablishment or religious education, but he is the best informed tariff reformer in the United Kingdom, and a fluent debater, with a business man's shrewd, direct method of arguing public questions. He is a man of force and a strenuous fighter, and will harass and provoke ministers by his bluntness of speech and persistence of attack. He will have a great reception at the meeting of the unionist associations and is likely to advise Lord Lansdowne to hang up the insurance bill in the Lords and display other signs of aggressive temper as leader. Like Walter Long, he can be depended upon to retire in favor of Mr. Balfour if the unionists are restored to power, whereas Austen Chamberlain has been marked out by an affectionate father for the highest honors.

Measured by the full statute of Mr. Balfour all these substitutes are undersized weaklings, altho behind made.

FOUR DEAD IN STEAMER FIRE

Were Suffocated by Smoke at Dova, England.

DOVER, Nov. 14—(By Wire)—In a fire aboard the steamer Wentworth today four members of the crew were suffocated by smoke and four other sailors seriously injured.

CROP OUTLOOK FOR NORTH WEST NOT VERY BRIGHT

WINNIPEG, November 13—Further details of the Northwest grain dealers' association's report on the crop situation tend to make the outlook not only for this year, but also for next year, anything but bright. The report says that only seventy per cent has yet been threshed, and about 50,000 bushels remain in the stack with no immediate prospect of seeing a separator. The setting in of a thaw would almost ruin it, at least reduce it several grades.

The report is not hopeful of the grain thrashed, saying that sixty per cent of it is four or under. Of the fifty million bushels remaining in the west half will be needed for seed and feed.

The prospect is darkened by the announcement that very little fall plowing has been done, owing to the sudden setting in of winter and that means delay in the spring.

Further comment on the congestion of traffic at Fort William is made. It is attributed to the incoming coal for the west due to the shortage caused by the western miners strike.

WILL BUILD DIRIGIBLE TO CROSS ATLANTIC

COLONGE, Germany, Nov. 13—Germans and Americans have formed a transatlantic aerial company, and are building a dirigible balloon with the object of crossing the Atlantic from the Tenerife Canary Islands to America early in 1912.

ENDED HIS LIFE

ST. JOHNSBURG, Vt., Nov. 13—His mind unbalanced it is believed by the sudden death of his favorite daughter and by financial difficulties, Nathan C. Butterfield of Milford, N. H., yesterday shot and killed G. Cuthbert Williams of York, Pa. Butterfield then turned the revolver upon himself, and accomplished his suicide. He leaves a wife and one daughter in Milford, N. H.
