200 MILLION FRANCS TO REBUILD FRENCH CITIES

(Special to The Guardian.)

NEW YORK, April 12.—A contract providing for the reconstruction of important buildings in the destroyed cities of northern France was closed between the French Government and Kennedy, Mitchell and Company, Bankers of New York, and London. It was announced here today. Virtually all the material to be used will be purchased in this country.

"This contract is for two hundred million francs," said Wm. A. Kennedy, President of Kennedy, Mitchell and Company. We have received important plans and specifications of a commission in charge of this work for the French Government. The Bank of France is back of this movement for building new France. This contract is the first that has been let for the betterment of conditions in devastated Europe and despite the heavy volume is a mere beginning.

Synopsis of Canadian Northwest Land Regulations

THE sole head of a family or any male over sixteen years old, may homestead a quarter section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. Applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the District. Entry by proxy may be made at any Dominion Lands Agency but not Sub-Agency on certain conditions.

1.—Six months residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years.

2.—A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres, on certain conditions. A habitable house is required except where residence is performed in the vicinity.

3.—In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter-section along side his homestead.

4.—Duties: Six months residence in each of three years after earning homestead patent; also 50 acres extra cultivation. Pre-emption patent may be obtained as soon as homestead patent, on certain conditions.

5.—A settler who has exhausted his homestead right may take a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties: 24 months residence in each of three years; cultivate 50 acres and erect a house worth \$500. The area of cultivation is subject to restriction in case of rough, scrubby or stony land. Low stock may be substituted for cultivation under certain conditions.
