This can be arranged by having a neighbor or two to join in the order, when requiring small quantities. Our terms are cash with order.

Annual bedding flower plants—Aster, Phlox, Stocks, Petunia, Verbena, Zinnia, Balsam, Salpiglossis, Scabiosa, Snapdragon, Cosmos, Marigold, Alyssum, Golden Feather, Ceneraria, Kochia, above 25c doz. prepaid.

Seedling Fanny, Sweet William, Forgetmenot, and seedling Carnation at 50c per doz.

Wintered over Perennials and Biennials—Fanny, Daisy, Sweet William, Forget-me-not \$1.20 per dozen. Perennial Larkspur, Digitalis or Fox Glove and Canterbury Bells at 25c each, \$2.25 per dozen. Double Holylocks, 20c each, \$1.75 per doz.

Vegetable Plants—Extra early Cabbage, Cauliflower and Celery 30c doz, \$1.50 per 100. Extra early Tomato, 60c doz, second early 40c doz, late tomato 30c doz. Include 5c doz. for postage. Cucumber, Squash, Pumpkin, Lettuce, Peppers, 25c doz. 5c extra for postage.
