"COMMIT WERNER HORN. TO STAND HIS TRIAL. BANGOR, Maine, March 19. -Werner Horn, who is charged with illegal interstate transportation of explosives in connection with his attempt to wreck the international railroad bridge at Vanceboro, will be taken to Boston for trial at the present term of the United States court, as a result of the finding of Federal Commissioner Charles H. Reid, here today. The Commissioner decided that the indictment warrant, which was the only evidence offered by the prosecution, was sufficient basis for holding the prisoner.

The motion of the defence for the release of Horn from the jail here, was a belligerent engaged in an act of war and not amenable to the courts of this country was denied. Horn was ordered to the county jail in Portland pending his removal to Boston. It is expected that he will be taken to Massachusetts early next week. At the suggestion of District Attorney Morrel, the Commissioner named \$10,000 as the amount of Horn's bail should be desired to finish it. His counsel, former Congressman Joseph F. O'Connell, and Daniel T. O'Connell, said tonight that no bonds would be arranged. Horn will probably go to Portland tomorrow in the custody of United States Marshal Wilson.
