Mr. Moore made an exceptionally brilliant record having an aggregate of 603 or an average of 86.5. He is remaining at the College to take advanced work in accounting.

THE death took place at Glencoe on April 2nd of Alexander McDonald, aged 77 years. The deceased had been in failing health for some weeks but was taken suddenly ill a few days previous to his death. The funeral services were conducted by Rev. Dr. Doyle and interment was at St. Joachim's. The late Mr. McDonald was a Christian man and a prominent member of the Roman Catholic Church. He had a most kindly nature and was a man of sterling integrity and irreproachable character. Truly death is no respecter of persons; old and young, rich and poor, must all succumb to the inevitable. He leaves a sorrowing widow, six sons and one daughter, two brothers and one sister, besides a host of relatives and friends to mourn their loss.

THE regular adjourned monthly meeting of the School Board was held last night. Reports of the teachers showed enrolment for the past month 1182; average attendance 906; percentage 87; no cases tardiness; 275 number truants; no visits by teachers; 148 corporal punishment cases; 9 below grading average; 71 requests to leave school early. The appointment of Miss Bessie Boyer in place of Miss Eva Rough in Prince Street School was endorsed. The change in the hours of Queen Square School suggested by the Principal was granted. The hours of the third grade are thus extended one hour and the session of the primary grades are changed to from 9 to 11 and from 1 to 3. The question of having two sessions instead of one was discussed at length but action was deferred till next meeting. Tenders for a new fence on School Street were authorized to be called. The fixing of the date for Arbor Day was left to the Principals and Supervisor.
