McLeod saw McNulty putting powder into the cartridge and taking matches out of his pocket. McLeod scented danger and asked Patriquin to leave. But the deceased would not allow him to go. A minute later the explosion occurred. McNulty was found standing against a tree. "Can you save me?" he cried. He was completely naked except that one boot was on, and died in five minutes.
