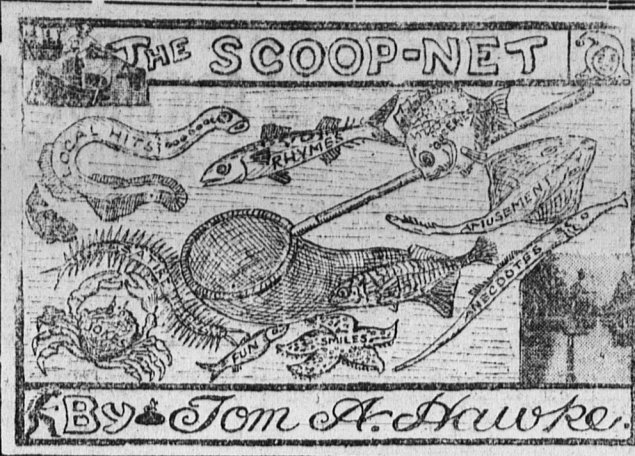

Camp Life With 105th

The following letter has been received from Pte. Frank Arsenault, formerly of Thos. Johnston Co., Ltd., Summerside and of C. Co's 105th Battalion, but now of 13th Reserve Batt. at Bramshot.

Bramshot Camp, Hants, Eng. Feb. 5, 1917.

Dear L.—Received your most welcome letter today, and was indeed very glad to hear from you. Everything around here has changed quite a bit since I wrote you last. There is no more 105th Batt., now it is all split up. There are about two hundred of our 105th boys with the 13th Reserve Batt. here at Bramshot, and some are in Willey yet, as the 105th Batt. I am with the 13th Reserve Batt.

We get plenty rabbit stew here, but we don't have to work very hard and I like the place very well, but not so good as Willey. I will try to describe the place to you, so you will have an idea what it is like. Our huts are in a hollow, with mountains about a mile high all round us and for miles and miles we can see nothing but huts, and about thirty or perhaps more are used as hospitals. On the left side there is the parade ground. It is a field about four miles long and a half mile wide and all day long we can see nothing but Canadian khaki drilling. In the centre of this field there is a place they call town. There is a R. C. Church and a moving picture show and a few small stores. There is no snow here yet, but the ground is frozen hard, so you see it is quite a home (nt)!

I was glad you told me all about the terrible fire in Summerside, I was wondering if your house was burnt. There can't be very many stores left now. We had another medical examination, and I passed fit for overseas, I suppose we will be soon leaving for France, and the sooner the better. I had a letter from my brother who is in France and he is fine and likes there alright. You know he was in the 105th Batt., but was transferred on the first draft. I will try and get one of his pictures and send it to you. I am sending you one of mine at last. Hope you like it all right.

I was to see R. C. Clow in the hospital, he is getting along fine and will be out this week. One of the nurses in that hospital is Miss Kelly from Summerside.

I trust you will write soon again for all of us boys like to get letters from dear old spud Island.

I will close now, bye bye.
