DOESN'T LIKE AUSTRIA GETTING MOUNT LOWEHAN

ROME, Jan. 10.—Public opinion in Rome is deeply stirred by reports that Mount Lowehan, dominating the Gulf of Cattaro, to Austria as compensation for the latter's acquiescence in Montenegro's possession of Scutari. The press declares that any territorial compensation whatsoever asked or accepted by Austria would give back to the other powers a free hand, and agreements and undertakings could not hold before such a procedure, which would destroy the balance in the Adriatic, and gravely jeopardize the peace of Europe.

GRAFT IN VANCOUVER.

VANCOUVER, B. C., Jan. 10.—Sensational disclosures have been made in connection with the financial affairs of the Vancouver school board. There have been rumors of graft of many thousands of dollars. Miss Florence Parker, former assistant secretary now sojourning in California confessed that she padded the pay-rolls for \$3,100 and spent the money Secretary C. W. Murray has made good the deficiency. Allegations of overdraws of fifty thousands dollars altogether have made, and an investigation is likely. The board admits that its business affairs have been loosely conducted.

CATCH WOMEN WITH MESMERIC GEMS.

NEW HAVEN, Jan. 7.—Several New Haven women, well known in society, have begged the police not to make public their names and expose their gullibility in lending their jewelry to Mrs. Mary Walters, who as "Mme. Eugenie," advertised herself as a trance medium and promised them she could give their diamonds mesmeric power.

"Mme. Eugenie" left town soon after obtaining the jewelry. Detective Healy arrested her in Atlantic City. He recovered all the diamonds.

\$675 FOR KILLING A MAN BY NEGLIGENCE.

SKOWEGAN, Me., January 2.—William Wilding, of Indianapolis, who was arrested in November last, charged with negligently shooting and killing Warren Holden, a guide, was discharged from custody today on payment of \$500 and costs, amounting in all to \$675. The court stipulated that the \$500 should be used for the benefit of the eight year old son of Holden.

CHARGED WITH JEWEL THEFT.

NEW YORK, Jan. 2.—A New York Herald cable from London says:—L. Ginnell, the fiery Nationalist member of Parliament for Westmeath, who alleges that the missing Dublin Crown jewels have been restored or will be if the Rt. Hon. Augustine Birrell, Chief secretary for Ireland, only says the word, asked in the House of Commons yesterday afternoon for Police Inspector Kane's report of his special mission to Ireland, in 1907.

When his request was denied, Mr. Ginnell bluntly asked if Kane's report did not contain the names of "Lord Haddo, Lord Ronald Gower and Lord—"

OPPOSE CHANGE IN LAW.

FREDERICTON, Jan. 10.—The Provincial Government's session is going on again today and before the members of the executive leave the city the legislative programme for the approaching session will be taken up and considered. This morning Messrs. T. H. Halsey and William E. Baxter, of St. John, with G. Earle Logan, St. John, as counsel, appeared before the government on behalf of the retail liquor dealers of St. John, in opposition to the movement to prevent the selling of liquor in bottles and except that consumed on the premises in saloons with retail licenses. The delegation were promised consideration.

FLOOD HAVOCS.

PITTSBURG, Jan. 9.—The crest of the river flood was reached here today, with a stage of 31.3 feet, eleven feet over the danger mark. Tonight the water is receding. A large area, including a number of streets in the business district, suffered inundation and the loss is heavy.

HELEN GOULD TO WED.

NEW YORK, Jan. 9.—The marriage of Miss Helen Gould to Finley J. Shepard of St. Louis is expected to be celebrated next week. It is said that Miss Gould has fixed the date of the wedding and that invitations will be issued within a few days. As these are to be confined to near relatives and friends, and a home wedding is decided upon in preference to a church affair, the arrangements will be kept as private as possible.

DYERS ON STRIKE.

LONDON, Jan. 9.—The textile trade in Yorkshire is in danger of coming to a standstill through a strike of dyers for higher wages. Six thousand dyers have quit work in the Bradford district; 5,000 more have given notice that they will quit in a week. The employers are willing to grant the increase demanded but they want to impose a system of piece work, to which the dyers are opposed.

TORONTO, Jan. 9.—The opening of the Ontario legislature will take place on Feb. 4.

CHANGE IN METHODIST CHURCH.

TORONTO, January 11.—In the future the Finance Board of the Methodist Church will be known as the Uniform System of Finance under the authority of the Methodist Church general conference. The executive decided this yesterday. An annual budget is to be prepared, including all the connectional funds.

LOU SCHOLES INJURED.

TORONTO, Jan. 8.—Lou F. Scholes, of "Diamond scull" fame, seriously slashed his wrist last night while assisting Detective Tipon in opening a suit case which belonged to a delinquent guest of the Athleta Hotel on Yonge street. The guest, who said he was Harry Barnes of Elmvale, Ont., had previously been arrested on a charge of obtaining money under false pretences, preferred by Charles Willis.
