WILL REGULATIONS BIND AMERICAN FISHERMEN

(Continued from page one.)

of the acts of the Newfoundland Legislature is, however, a basis for the expectation that they are prepared to recognize a very liberal construction of the existing laws concerning American fishing rights in Canadian waters.

The question to be settled at the outset is the application of the foreign fishing vessels act of 1906, which imposes on American fishing vessels certain restrictions in addition to those that were imposed by the old act of 1905. There is also a question of the right of the Newfoundlanders to board American vessels and bring them into port under certain conditions.

The Newfoundland law prohibits the shipment of Newfoundlanders as members of the crews of American fishing vessels plying their trade in Newfoundland waters. It also prohibits Sunday fishing and the use of purse seines. All of these provisions are obnoxious to the Gloucester fishermen, with the possible exception of the Sunday law, and indeed they are not now in effect, their operation having been suspended by the modus vivendi which was reached last year between the British foreign office and Ambassador Reith as a preliminary to the adjustment of the fisheries dispute by The Hague. But as the decision of that tribunal has now been rendered, the modus vivendi has expired, and the old fishing regulations would apply in full force unless something is done by the present conference to reach a better understanding.

Sir—You quote an article from The Pioneer re the winter boats. The editor is mildly sarcastic where seething sarcasm would have been applicable, but there is something to be said in mitigation of the running away of the Minto. It will be remembered that just about this time last year under similar conditions the Grey did precisely the same thing and if the captain had not, on the iniquitous remonstrance of the people, been ordered back it is probable he would have run to Georgetown all winter, though this port was open and easily made till spring.

It would not have been necessary to recall this incident had not the Board of Trade, incited by some inexplicable whim, or some motive which "no feller" can understand, ignoring his desertion of our port, got up and presented a fulsome eulogy on the captain's conduct. Now the captain of the Minto doubtless looked upon this as a precedent and said to himself, "If the Grey is lauded without cause, if I do the same why should I not get a recognition of merit?" But The Pioneer does not take that view of it. It seems as though the people were at last waking up to the fact that they have been for years sat upon by these captains and been humbly accepting their ipse dixit as to where and when they should run the boats. You, Mr. Editor, hit it exactly when you said in a recent article, that the "comfort and convenience of the captains was alone to be considered and not the needs of the public." It is beyond dispute that there is much more comfort in running to Georgetown than to Charlottetown, but let us hope that in future that will not be the first consideration.
