Synopsis of Canadian Northwest Land Regulations

The sole head of a family or any male over eighteen years of age, may homestead a quarter section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. Applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the District. Entry may be made at any Dominion Lands Agency but not Sub-Agency on certain conditions.

Legislative Assembly Prince Edward Island

RULES RELATING TO PRIVATE BILLS.

36. All petitions for Private Bills must be presented within fourteen days after the commencement of the session exclusive of adjournment.

37. No Private Bill shall be brought into the House, but upon a petition first presented, truly stating the case at the peril of the suitors for such Bill and such petition must be signed by the said parties.

38. A committee will be appointed at the commencement of every Session consisting of five members of whom three shall be a quorum, to be denominated "The Private Bills Committee," to whom shall be referred every private Bill and no proceedings after the first reading shall be had upon such Bill until such Committee has reported thereon to the House.

39. So soon as the Committee has reported any Bill, such Bill together with any amendments that may be suggested by the Committee, shall be printed at the expense of the parties who are suitors for such Bill and printed copies thereof delivered to the members before the second reading if deemed necessary by the Committee.

40. No Bill for the particular interests of any person or persons, Corporation or Corporations or body or bodies of people shall be read a second time until all fees be paid for the same into the hands of the Clerk of the House.

41. No Bill having for its object the vesting in or conferring upon any person or persons, Municipality or Body Corporate the title to any tract of land shall be received or read in the House unless at least four weeks' notice containing a full description of the land in question has been published in the Royal Gazette and one other newspaper in this province of the intention of such person or persons Municipality or Body Corporate to apply for such Bill.

IN MEMORIAM

MRS. PETER LAWLESS.

The death took place in Norborough on Wednesday, Nov. 8th, of Margaret, wife of Mr. Peter Lawless in the 66th year of her age. The deceased had been ailing for some months and her demise was not unexpected. She was well known as a kind, Christian woman, and highly respected in the neighborhood.

Besides a sorrowing husband, she leaves to mourn a family of three sons and four daughters who have the sympathy of the community in their loss. The funeral took place on Friday, the 10th, inst., to St. James' Catholic Church, Freetown, and a very large number attended to pay a last tribute to one who was beloved by all. High Mass was celebrated by her pastor, Rev. Mgr. Gillis, who spoke a few words in reference to the many good Christian qualities possessed by the deceased.—R. I. P.

MR. JOHN BIRCH.

The death occurred at his home in this city, on Thursday, of Mr. John Birch, late of the employ of the Rogers Hardware Co., Ltd. He had been in failing health for some time. He leaves to mourn a widow, formerly Miss Aggie Gillis, of Summerside, and three children, Audrey, Erle, and Lloyd, besides his mother and three brothers of Toronto, Ontario, one of whom is a prisoner of war in Germany. He also leaves one sister, Mrs. Rogers, of Vernon B. C. Deceased was forty years of age and came here from Summerside where the remains will be taken for interment this morning.

Some years ago Mr. Birch conducted a bicycle repair shop in Charlottetown, and had wide acquaintance. During his illness he was attended by his pastor, Rev. Maurice McDonald, and died fortified with the rites of the R. C. Church. A funeral service will be held in St. Paul's Church, Summerside, this morning.

MR. P. H. TRAINOR.

Critics learned with a deep sense of regret yesterday of the death of Mr. Peter H. Trainor, the well-known painter and decorator. He had been in failing health for about a year and latterly it became apparent that his life on earth was drawing to its close. By his death Charlottetown has lost a valuable and highly esteemed citizen. As painter and decorator he was a master of his craft, and his work was in demand not only in the city, but in other parts of the province, as many of the principal edifices, and public buildings are the work of his hand. He was probably the oldest member of the trade on the Island and had the honor of belonging to the organization known as the Master Painters' Association of Canada and the United States. He was a native of this city, and had reached his seventy-third year when called to his eternal rest.

A member of the A. O. H., he enjoyed the esteem and respect of the members of that society. Mr. Trainor was twice married, his second wife being Miss Lantry, who survives him, together with the family of his first wife, namely, Frank, in Boston, who arrived shortly before his father's death; Mrs. T. E. O'Connor, in Everett, Mass.; Fred H. and J. Austin, at home; who will ever cherish his memory while mourning their loss.

MRS. JOHN ADAMS.

There passed peacefully to her eternal rest at the home of her daughter, Mrs. Hiram Woodside, Kensington on Saturday, Nov. 11th, Martha Sudsbury, relict of the late John Adams, in the 93rd year of her age. Deceased was born at Spring Valley June 7, 1824 and spent the greater part of her life there until her death.

Her husband was a woman of strong exemplary character, a faithful follower of Christ. She leaves to mourn five daughters and one son; Mrs. Isaacs Adams, Miscouche, Mrs. James Champion, Darnley, Mrs. Paul Woodside, Melbourne; Mrs. Hiram Woodside, Kensington, Mrs. Allan McNeill, Malpeque; and John Knutsford, also one brother, John Sudsbury, Spring Valley, thirty-one grandchildren. The funeral which was held on Monday, was very largely attended, despite the inclement weather. A short service was held at the home after which the remains were taken to the Methodist Church when an impressive service was conducted by Rev. G. A. Sellar, at the close of which Mrs. Sellar sang very sweetly that beautiful hymn, "Some Sweet Morn." The pall bearers were James Champion, Hiram Woodside, Allan McNeill, John Adams, Wm. Adams and J. EXPECT FURTHER ADVANCE OF BRITISH.

BERLIN, Nov. 15.—(Via London, Nov. 16.)—Several military critics discussing the British gains on the Ancre in the newspapers, recognize that they resulted in part at least, in a betterment of the tactical position, for which the British are striving. Major Von Schriebschoten, writing in the Mittagzeitung, says that the most supreme command undoubtedly reckoned upon such developments, when it decided to concentrate its efforts in the Roumanian theatre and leave in the west only the forces absolutely necessary to maintain the defensive.

Major Morath in the Tagesblatt, finds in the event the text for a homily on the necessity of bending every effort to stimulate the production of munitions.

He says: "The general strategic situation in the west is not decisively affected but the possibility that the British may succeed in broadening the breach to the northward is not without importance. The British army command, by its push on the thirteen after submitting our salient to a heavy fire from the west and southwest, has gained ground to the northeast along the front about ten kilometers broad."

Letter From Son In War Hospital

Mrs. Peter Lacey, of Blooming Point, has received the following letters, the first from her son, Sgt. J. R. Lacey, who is now in Edinburgh War Hospital, and the second from Lt. Col. Wright, telling her that her son was wounded:

Ward 20, Edinburgh War Hospital, Balgair, West Lothian, Scotland.

Dear Mother: I am attempting to write you a short letter. I do not know whether you will be able to read it or not as I have just got the point of my thumb out through the bandage under which I have a badly mutilated hand. I have not lost any fingers although two of them are in fairly bad condition, but they are improving well now, and the pain is beginning to leave them pretty well, so I am making my first attempt to write.

I am having a very good time in the hospital, quite a change, I assure you, from the Somme district where I received my wounds, but I guess it will be a month or so before I go back to France, I think I had a very good share over there. Just twenty months ago an operation performed on my hand at Boulogne and had it under X Ray here but I do not think there is any shrapnel left in it, so I guess it will be alright before long.

It seems funny that I got into a hospital so near Edinburgh, but I fought hard to get here, and since I came I had friends out to see me several times and expect callers again this afternoon, but I guess it will soon stop for expect to be sent to a Canadian hospital soon, but I am satisfied now since I saw my friends.

Now mother, I am getting along fine and it will be two weeks tomorrow since I got hit, so there is nothing to worry over. I will stop now as it is very difficult to write but I will write longer letters when I get my bandage reduced. Hope all are well. Love from KEN.

France, Oct. 3 '16

Dear Mrs. Lacey: I deeply regret having to inform you that your son, Kenneth, a Sergeant with my unit, was wounded yesterday while on duty at the front.

I am glad to say the wound is not a dangerous one—shrapnel in the right hand, and should cause you no anxiety. Officers and men were sorry to hear of your son's mishap. He was popular with one and all and always cheerful and willing to do his duty.

TO TAKE BREMEN'S PLACE.

WASHINGTON, November 16.—Another great transatlantic merchant submarine to take the place of the Bremen, sister ship of the Deutschland, which was lost with all hands on her maiden voyage to the United States, now is being built in Germany.

Definite information regarding the new vessel is lacking. The submarine, it is said here, will be purely mercantile in character, her arrangement being similar to that of the Deutschland. It is not known when the vessel will be ready for her first trip to the United States.

The Deutschland, it was learned today, will not carry any regular mails from the United States to Germany on the coming trip.
