## LOCAL BRIEFS

The mail train arrived in the city at 11.40 Saturday night.

THE Y. M. C. A. of Canada are sending a representative to the South African war field to carry on work among the soldiers. The city and Dalhousie college associations are undertaking to raise some funds for the necessary expenses.—Halifax Herald.

A LIST published in the Militia Gazette shows the order of seniority of the officers who have gone to the Transvaal. Major Arnold is the senior captain, with Major Weeks in second place. Among the lieutenants Captain F. C. Jones comes sixth, Lieut. J. H. Kaye fourteenth, while Lieut. Weldon McLean is the junior of the corps.—St. John Sun.

Cigars, tobacco, confectionery, canned fruit, etc., contributed by many of our public spirited citizens are also being forwarded.

Bishop Courtney spent Wednesday, Thursday and Friday last in St. Paul's Parish, Port Morien. On Wednesday (All Saints' day) he consecrated the church at Old Bridgeport, setting it apart forever for the worship of God, according to the rites and ceremonies of the Church of England. In spite of the rain, a large congregation assisted in the service, and listened with profit to the Bishop's sermon. In the evening he administered the apostolic rite of "laying on of hands" to nine candidates at St. Mary's, Little Glace Bay; on Thursday evening to eighteen candidates at St. Paul's, Port Morien, and on Friday evening to fourteen candidates at St. John's Reserve Mines. He is now doing like work in the parish of Louisburg. Acadian Recorder.

THE service in the First Methodist church yesterday evening received a large attendance, considering the disagreeable weather. Dr. Carman, General Superintendent of the Methodist church of Canada, selected for his subject: "What Mean Ye by These Stones." He referred to Methodism in its early days and its marked progress in America, and urged his hearers to contribute to the Twentieth Century Thanksgiving Fund in order to place the church on an independent basis. His address is highly spoken of by the congregation. Up to last night the amount taken by the First Methodist Church for the Century Fund was \$1300.

GRACE CHURCH.—Rev. Dr. Carman spoke on behalf of the 20th Century Fund, taking for his text, II Cor. 9-8: "And God is able to make all grace abound toward you; that ye, always having all sufficiency in all things may abound to every good work." He said that we have much to be thankful for in the forward movement of this century; in our own church from the meetings held in small rooms years ago to the thousands of churches of the day. He closed with an appeal for funds for the removal of the debt of the church and met with a ready response. There is a good prospect of the debt being entirely wiped out. The music rendered by the choir added materially to the service.
