Quebec Liquor For Ontario (Special to The Guardian) QUEBEC, June 22.—Over one million dollars worth of liquor which had not yet been delivered to the Quebec Liquor Commission by former authorized vendors in this city will be read for shipment to the province of Ontario in the course of the next few days, following the ruling of the Railway Commission in Ottawa. The largest portion of the stock has not been affected by the increase in duties enforced from the first of May and will, it is understood be sold at a reasonable price. Orders are flowing in. The express companies have not yet however, started to accept the shipment of liquors but are wanting definite instructions from Ottawa which are due here this evening.
