U. S. MILITARY PRISONERS GO

New York, June 5 - Sawing their way through the steel bars of their cells in Castle William, three military prisoners escaped from Governor's Island yesterday and have not been captured. A boat in which they escaped leaveth from the island, and they carried the steel window bars with them. The men are Henry Tomer, R. Campbell and Frank West. They were serving two and one half years' terms respectively for theft, sleeping on post and desertion. The men used a rope ladder and blankets with which to make their escape. They sawed the bars of their cell and the fact that they had saws and used a rope ladder leads the authorities at the island to believe that the prisoners had outside help, and a rigid investigation has been ordered. Guards were on duty all hours of night and day. The first knowledge of an escape was when a sentinel spotted the rope ladder dangling from the cell window.
