That Car of Yours

Heart-to-Heart Talks With Automobile Owners and Drivers on How to Get the Most Out of Their Cars at the Least Expense.

ALIGNMENT OF WHEELS

When a car is running, the wheels, both front and rear, should be absolutely parallel, or an equal distance apart. However, as the steering knuckles of most cars are placed to one side, instead of within the wheels there is a tendency for the wheels to spread apart, due to the resistance of the road. Upon observation it will be seen that the bottoms of the wheels are slightly closer together than the tops. The reason for this is to bring the bottoms of the wheel nearer under the pivots on which they turn. And of course this also has the tendency to make the wheels run away from each other. However, to offset the two forces mentioned, the fronts of the wheels are brought slightly closer together. But the differences between the two measurements should not exceed a quarter of an inch.

It is advisable to keep the wheels in perfect alignment at all times, for the treads of the tires will wear very rapidly if they are not kept true.

CARRYING A BATTERY

It is both awkward and difficult to carry a heavy storage battery by the two handles that are provided for this purpose. Quite often the handles are too small for a large hand and usually they are so thin that the edges cut into the flesh when necessary to carry the battery for any considerable distance. But a convenient carrying handle can be quickly constructed by taking a length of one-half inch pipe, flatten it at each end, from one end into a hook to go under one of the battery handles, the other into U-shape to fit under the other handle. The purpose of the U-shaped end is to permit handling batteries of various lengths, which would not be possible were the carrying handle made to fit only one size battery box.

EMERGENCY ROADSIDE REPAIRS

Should trouble occur on the road which necessitates the use of a vice for holding some part while the work is being done with both hands, a very efficient emergency vice can be constructed out of the ordinary screw jack with a piece of wire wrapped around it several times. Place the part under the wire, of course, and then screw the jack up against it until it takes the necessary hold. If no wire is in the tool-box, try holding the part to be repaired on top of the jack and then screwing the jack against some rigid part of the car, such as a wheel hub or an axle.

THE TIRE PUMP

Many hand tire pumps do not operate satisfactorily, caused by the leather washer failing to seal the cylinder properly on the down stroke. But the pump can be made to operate better, giving less leakage past the washers, if the plunger rod is threaded a few inches farther back and another cup washer is added.

FACTS ABOUT SPRINGS

The majority of car owners believe that when a spring breaks upon a car plunging into a deep rut or hole, that the breakage is caused by the impact of the car's weight as it plunges downwards. But the truth of the matter is that when a spring breaks under these conditions, it is usually caused by the rebound and not by the downward movement. As the car goes downwards, the weight of the load is borne by all of the springs at the same time, while on the rebound the force is taken by the various leaves of the springs individually, one after another, and for that reason is more pronounced when the spring clips are loose. The breakage of springs, therefore, occurs more frequently when the clips are loose, and it is well to inspect the clips and keep them properly tightened.

WOODEN WHEELS

The customary remedy for loose wooden wheels is to soak them in water, but too often this proves to be only a temporary remedy. When a wheel becomes loose it is an indication that it needs paint, but if it is swollen with water and then paint is applied, the paint will not adhere to the damp wood. A very good solution to this problem is to see first of all that the wood is perfectly dry and then give it a good bath in linseed oil. The oil will make the wheel swell. Then if it is painted, the paint will adhere properly.

Livestock Markets

(Canadian Press)

MONTREAL, Que., June 18.—(Livestock)—There were 80 cattle, 114 calves, 105 hogs and 120 sheep and lambs, for sale today, on the two markets including about 700 hogs held over from yesterday's market. There was neither enough quantity nor quality of cattle offered to interest buyers very much and sales were moving slowly at prices ranging from \$4.00 for canners to \$7.50 or \$8.00 for medium cows and from \$7.00 to \$8.50 for plain bulls. Calves were of common to medium quality and were sold for \$7.60 to \$10.30 with the bulk of the common kinds from \$15.00 to \$17.00 per cwt. Sheep were from \$5.00 to \$7.00. Hogs of good weights brought from \$13.50 to \$13.75 fed and watered flat. Heavy and rough hogs were not selling, sows were from \$9.50 to \$10.50.
