### AUTOMATIC REVOLVERS FOR LONDON POLICE

LONDON, Dec. 11--In a short time London will cease to be a paradise for swift-footed and pugnacious burglars. The metropolitan police have received from the home office the first consignment of automatic revolvers, and in the future at least 2,000 "hobbies" will not depend upon a fleet foot and trusty fist to capture and subdue malefactors. The new revolver is an automatic gun of American design and carries nine cartridges which can be fired in five seconds. An extra magazine holding eight shells will be carried, so the next policeman who is compelled to hesitate an anarchist will be able to fire seventeen shots at a range of 200 yards before calling for the aid of the military. The weapon will be carried under the policeman's tunic and owing to its flat shape there will be no bulge to betray its presence. The men will be armed gradually, the first to receive guns being those on special details and patrolmen stationed on dangerous beats.

### CRUDE OIL AS FUEL ON THE C. P. R.

CALGARY, Alta., December 11-- It was stated on good authority here today that the Canadian Pacific railway has decided to use crude oil for fuel for its locomotives on a portion of its British Columbia division. This rumor has been current for some months, Sir William White, ex-vice-president of the C. P. R., having made a statement last summer that the matter was receiving consideration at headquarters. It is also said that in this connection circular

These three singers are always favorites and they added much to the success of the evening by their superior singing.

Taking the evening as a whole it was a most successful one. Prof. Ball added to his laurels which already are many. The organ proved itself to be a very fine instrument it responding to the touch of the artist. The quality is most marked, and Prof. Ball, gave a remarkable variety to the Recital using every inch of the organ available.

Pastor Fash briefly thanked Prof. Ball for his services, and assured him that whenever he came back to Charlottetown to give another Recital he would be gladly received. He also thanked the soloists and their accompanist for their assistance.

A new way of singing God Save the King was introduced by Prof. Ball. Miss Bremner sang the first half stanza as a solo and then the audience sang the same. Then she sang the last half of the stanza and the audience after her, sang the same. It made a good ending for most enjoyable musical evening.

The Baptist Church is to be congratulated on securing such a fine organ, so well adapted to their church and having such a fine quality of tone and combinations.

## THREE BOYS ARRESTED ON MANY CHARGES

The real need of a reformatory in which to confine and correct young boys who go astray was never demonstrated with greater emphasis than yesterday afternoon when, at four o'clock, three appeared before His Honor Magistrate Martin in the city police court three young lads ranging in age from twelve to fifteen. These little fellows were charged with a series of minor depredations which are usually preliminary to the greater offences which in later years constitute the fully developed and crafty law-breaker.

The following are a few of the offences which have been credited to the young fellows:

Some days ago they threw stones at an elderly man and woman who were in a carriage driving out Kent St. They struck the woman twice and the man once. Inviting an old lady to come out to the door by resorting to the old time method of ringing the door bell and then retreating to the middle of the street, they threw a very hard and icy snowball at her, striking her on the head.

Obtaining five dollars from a questionable source they bought two revolvers and a number of cartridges and these they carried round for a number of days until they were discovered and taken from them. The eldest of the young fellows administered a very severe thrashing to a young chap who, in passing on the street, acced the armed chap of carrying weapons.

By means of keys which the eldest secured from his brother, presumably without his consent or knowledge, the three obtained access to the old Davis & Fraser Pork Factory on Kent street and from the roof of this building they became accurate in the high art of throwing stones and pebbles from the gravel roof. About a week ago they were arrested on a charge of breaking nine dollars worth of windows in the little store on the corner of Kent and Hillsboro Street opposite the factory. They were found guilty and the boys' parents had to disgorge to the extent named. They were dismissed with a warning.

And they did not stop there, probably not having been inspired with a prying of the law owing to the leniency with which they were so graciously dealt on their first appearance. Sympathy was perhaps lost on them. Yesterday morning a complaint was laid before Sgt. Bradley that windows were being, at that time broken in the Central Christian Church. Accompanied by officer McInnis Sgt. Bradley proceeded without delay to the scene and they worked their way into the building. After some searching the boys were located in the dark cellar and were discovered by the aid of a lantern. Sgt. Bradley picked up a bunch of keys in the basement which one of them had thrown down before being taken.

It developed that fourteen panes of glass had been broken, all of them stained, and in the court room two of the young fellows acknowledged to breaking three yesterday morning and one the previous day.

At the police court Dr. McLellan of St. Dunstan's Cathedral appeared for the boys and they were given just one more chance on their being vouchsafed for by their clergyman.

During the progress of their hearing it was brought out that they were supposed to have been connected with the loss of a gold watch valued at thirty dollars and four watch chains, which Mrs. Basba, now in the Asylum, had lost some time ago. The boys denied all knowledge of this, however.

The young fellows left the court room apparently moved by the serious nature of their own cases as impressed firmly, but kindly by the magistrate and Dr. McLellan. The boys are from two families, there being two brothers. These latter two lost their mother some time ago and have been particularly hard boys to manage. The other chap, the oldest, has a father and mother, but is inclined to select his own path.

It was felt yesterday by the magistrate that it would be too hard a punishment to send the little fellows to jail where influence might be brought to bear, which would affect their whole future career as well as putting a blot on their character which could hardly be effaced by time. His Honor was loath to do this and in spite of the serious nature of the offences gave them another chance to reform. Dr. McLellan accepting the responsibility for the boys' behaviour in the future.

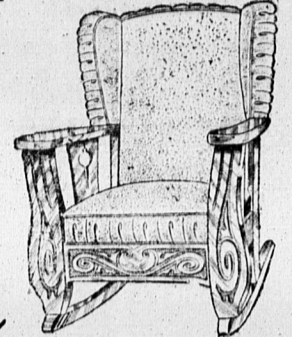

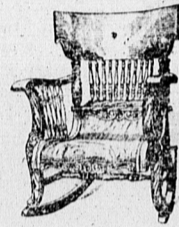
