The Major had a son, Captain Burrows, in that country, and both he and his wife are naturally very anxious concerning his fate, as well as that of Captain Kenneth Barr, of Montreal, who accompanied Captain Burrows to Tokio. Brigadier Barr, father of Captain Barr, is at present in charge of the work in the West Indies.

As the Salvation Army with their characteristic promptness are arranging to send help to stricken Japan at once. It is essential that there be no delay in raising funds for this very worthy object. With this end in view, special collections are to be taken in every Corps on Sunday night, so that the Salvation Army may once again show its practical sympathy and interest in assisting a nation that has met with so terrible a disaster, with millions of homeless and starving people. The Salvation Army itself in Japan suffered heavily, losing a number of their hospitals, and possibly a number of their workers although the exact extent of the disaster to the Army will not be known for some time.

In the Charlottetown Citadel, as well as all other Citadels, wherever the Army is located, special collections will be taken on Sunday.
