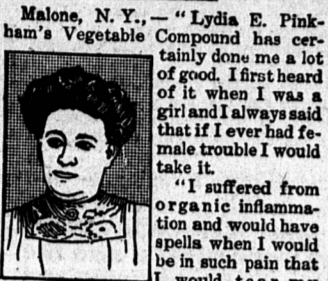

FOX FURS TO BE DEARER

(Special to The Guardian.) MONTREAL, Jan. 21.—Reductions in the price of coon, muskrat and some mink furs may be looked for, according to A. J. Gough, of the fur manufacturing firm of Sellers-Gough. Mr. Gough is at the Windsor Hotel, from Toronto. Persian lamb furs, he says, will remain about the same, as will the best minks, while cross-fur furs will probably be dearer next season. The reason for the lowering of the coons and muskrats is that they have been abnormally high, he says. Mr. Gough thinks there will be a little market in Canada for the large numbers of black fox skins that will be offered when furs have developed to such an extent in the Maritime Provinces that there will be skins for sale instead of only live foxes. No one but an expert, he says, would be able to distinguish the difference between the product and the real black fox. By this process the fur obtained sold for about \$250, while people ask \$2,000 for a single genuine black fox skin and it requires two or three of them to make a good set of furs.

C. R. TRAIN IS WRECKED AT SIDDALL'S

(Special to The Guardian.) MONCTON, Jan. 21.—The Intercolonial Express which left here at 2.30 this morning for Halifax and Sydney was derailed, all except the engine, at Siddall's Curve, east of Backville, two hours later. All the cars are on their sides and track is torn up but no one was hurt. A wrecking train was sent from here.

(Special to The Guardian.) MONCTON, Jan. 21.—The sleeping car fell down the embankment but was caught by the deep snow and telegraph poles. The eighteen passengers were turned topsy-turvy. The car was splintered at one end and the clerks had difficulty getting out.

ENJOYABLE CARNIVAL

To an unaccustomed eye, the eye of one who has never before been privileged to witness a similar event the Carnival must be impressive not only as a spectacular novelty but as a scenic production of exceeding brilliance. It is a picture which cannot fail indelibly to imprint itself on the mind, an animated picture of promiscuous colours, blended in fascinating fashion—a picture of the kind which presents itself to the lively imagination with irresistible recurrence, long after he has disappeared in the reality. Such was the spectacle at the Arena Rink on Tuesday evening, when a large crowd of Charlottetown's skaters, arrayed in costumes of a hundred and one tints, assembled on the ice in a conglomeration of splendour.

The ice was perfect, and in it there was an incentive to healthful frolic and pleasurable recreation than which other sports can afford a better. And the skaters did consummate justice to it. They glided around the rink in a variety of inconceivable ways; treading tortuous courses from end to end, turning sharp corners with baffling abruptness, stopping suddenly in their dizzy speed, (when an inexperienced bystander naturally holds his breath in apprehension for the safety of some dashing figure in horrifying proximity to a post at the side) and almost simultaneously tearing up the course in the opposite direction—and all these apparently (only apparently) hazardous feats with an ease and confidence assurance that confounds the understanding of the non-skater. But it was not all an exhibition of daring and skill, in so far as the execution of fantastic manoeuvres was concerned; it was more than merely that. It was an excellent display of graceful art, when the band played the soft melody of some alluring waltz, is a display of skill of a different kind from that of racing round at a dangerous pace. It was indeed a unique sight; and the spectator, standing at one corner of the gallery, beheld in a panorama a regularly moving sea of coloured dresses. There were costumes which one generally sees at ordinary fairs, not of particularly original conception, but costumes which attracted curiosity notices, and costumes which were not noticed at all (these were however, only every day attire). But there were also disguises which betrayed at once, in their wearers, uncommon ingenuity and originality and a commendable sense of humour. There was, for instance, absolutely no overlooking the comical donkey. This was a clever contrivance of three young men who, encased in a covering very closely resembling the skin of a grey donkey, paraded the rink, provoking hysterical laughter on all sides. Their peregrinations funny in the extreme. Then there was the ludicrously opposed combination of the nun, attired in white, her sister in black the monk in one color and his brother in another,—all holy persons on one hand, and on the other hand Mephistopheles, decked in gorgeous red, the garments becoming a satanic personage. This visitor from the nether land was imposing in more ways than one, and if the glaring wings which adorned his shoulders did not strike awe and fear into the breasts of everyone, his diabolical mouth another ingenious invention—assuredly, it opened and shut incessantly, and as its owner sped silently and swiftly by, ever and anon, the idea of an infernal being was irrefragable. This struck the writer as a particularly well-conceived dress. It was therefore only appropriate that the ecclesiastical waters should give His Majesty the cold shoulder, which they did religiously. There were black ladies whose straight noses and delicately out features rendered them rather an enigma. There were several old black men, too, and one fellow was excruciating in his beauty. Court jesters were on the ice also, and they even condescended to lend the royal dignity of their company to such common folk as ordinary cowboys. And where there are cow-boys miners may at times be found; so, therefore, were there miners in the rink. Indian girls, muttering things in un-understandable language, fitted to and fro, disturbing the tranquillity and peace of mind of the sedate and sober gentlemen on their backs, proclaimed them to all and sundry as long Course Students. Then again there were boy scouts and soldiers, both male and female; the scouts endeavouring vainly to arrest a naughty (and very evasive) young man, who flew around the place imitating the squeak of a pig. There was a gentleman on the ice who, disguised as a girl bearing the placard "16 and only 3 Beaux," baffled the attempt of all, (including his own children!) to identify him. A young lady aviator who wore the ship of cloth "Guess who?" set many folk "guessing who," and guessing wrong all the time. A young gentleman in immaculate white vest skated a few rounds alone, when the same lady with whom he skated every band at the last Carnival come up and went around twice with him. And she never recognized him for a moment. Good disguise that! Some of the skaters reminded one vividly of the sale of Walla Wool, presented in Charlottetown some time ago, by the costumes they wore. And in these days of the suffragettes, it would have been strange had none of the rebellious creatures been there. But they were there, and no fear.
