Races Start at One O'Clock Sharp. 2.15 TROT AND PACE Purse \$200. 2.30 TROT AND PACE Purse \$250. 2.30 PACE, Stake, (closed). Purse \$250.

Entries in the 2.15 class close Wednesday, Aug. 23rd. Entrance fee five per cent. of purse, and five per cent. additional from money winners. Five to enter and at least three to start. Purse divided 50, 25, 15 and 10 per cent. of purse. Races to finish at the end of fifth heat. All mite heats in harness. Any horse distancing the field, or any part thereof, entitled to one money only. Right reserved to change order of program, or to declare race off where sufficient number of entries are not received, and to make a new class, to reject any entry, or bar any driver. Two or more horses trained or owned in the same stable may start in the same class, when full entrance money is paid on each. National Trotting Association Rules to govern, except where they conflict with the above conditions.

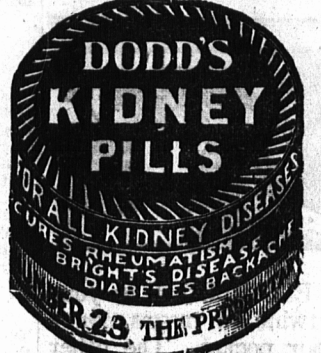
