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## FIRST RESULTS OF NO EXHIBITION

### A Stock-Breeder Gives His View of Present Stock Prospects

### GOVERNMENT'S DUTY TO LEAD THE PEOPLE

#### As Was Done by the Federal Government in Dairy Matters — Government Competition and the Want of an Exhibition Led to the Bovyer Stock Sales and Much of Our Best Stock Has Gone to Other Provinces.

Having seen, in your's and other newspapers of Charlottetown, within the last few months several articles written in favor of Exhibitions, I have wondered that the Government of this Province, the revenues of which are almost wholly derived from agriculture could for a moment hesitate to spend the money necessary for a grant for that purpose. Not very many years ago I can recollect there were but very few, if any, of our farmers who were stock raisers of any but of inferior nondescripts.

Within the last ten or twelve years several of our farmers have gone to great expense in importing pure bred animals and have been very successful in raising stock and have enabled their brother farmers to improve their herds by breeding to those pure bred animals thus imported.

The men, who thus imported stock at high prices, thought and rightly so, that Exhibitions such as those held in Charlottetown in recent years and especially the one last year would encourage farmers to breed to these imported pure bred animals, and by that means they would be recuperated to some extent at least for the large amount of money spent by them in importing such stock.

These men, one would naturally think had drawn proper conclusions but after a few years in each of which new stock of a better class was being imported, the Government in the year 1898 without any warning declined to give a grant for Exhibition purposes. The same course was followed by them in the year 1899.

The disadvantages of not holding an Exhibition were not fully realized during the first year and probably not during the second, but even then several of the chief importers of such pure bred stock were feeling the result when the Government in 1900 gave a grant for a Maritime Exhibition which was held and was indeed a credit to the Province.

Our stock breeders then took new heart, thinking we were going to have an exhibition annually and some of them travelled all the way to Ontario last autumn and imported animals of the very best breeding to add to their herds so that they would be in a position to have still better animals to show at the Exhibition which they fully expected would be held again this autumn.

I understand however it has been announced that there will be no grant for Exhibition purposes this year and as a first result, others of which I am informed are to follow shortly, a few days ago the stock of two of our chief exhibitors, one a breeder of horses and the other of Shorthorn cattle, were sold at public auction on the Exhibition grounds in Charlottetown.

The most valuable of the cattle sold were purchased by stock raisers from abroad and they have now gone never to return again.

The history of one cow sold at that sale deserves special mention. She was imported by Mr. F. G. Bovyer of Georgetown as a yearling from a gentleman in Ontario and at the sale a few days ago was purchased by her original owner for the handsome sum of \$350.00. This gentleman evidently knew what a valuable animal she was and had had of such blood in his herd or he would never have paid the sum he did and also the additional expense of taking her back to Ontario again.

To my mind this sale should be a lesson to our Government and our people. Are the several valuable herds of cattle still remaining on this Island to go from us? Are all the benefits which have been derived from the careful breeding of the last few years to be lost to us? It looks like it, but surely our Government now that they have seen the first bad result of having no Exhibition will take warning in time.

The much talked of exodus of our people is likely to be equalled now by the withdrawal of this and other herds from this Province.

An annual Exhibition is an absolute necessity in this Province and I care not what Government may be in power, the withholding of a grant for such purpose is a grave dereliction of duty and one for which they will receive retaliation at the hands of the people.

It is a Government's duty to lead the people, not to be led by them. Had the Dominion Government waited till the farmers of this Province had asked for the butter and cheese industries, if they had not sent such a man as Professor Robertson here to educate our farmers in these lines, it is safe to say these industries would have been in the same state as they were twenty years ago.

In a similar manner if our Governments do not give assistance to Exhibitions for the purpose of giving our people object lessons in the results which have been obtained by others and can be obtained by them if they are encouraged so to do instead of progress being made in the lines above mentioned the reverse will happen.

I cannot think but that the Parliament now in session will give a grant and my hope is that one of the first items to be seen in the estimates shortly to be brought down will be a sum voted for an Exhibi-

tion so that one at least equal to that of last year may be held.

It is true the time is getting short but even now I believe that the Exhibition management would be willing to undertake carrying it out in the same creditable manner which they have heretofore done.
