Gigantic Force Latent in Atom

LONDON, Oct. 18.—By the liberation of the atom man may some day have under his control a force which will perform for him the entire work of the world, but if it gets beyond his control it may blow the earth and all its inhabitants to smithereens, Dr. Aston of Cambridge, said in a lecture delivered recently before the members of the British Association. But the chances of such a catastrophe are practically negligible, he explained.

Dr. Aston opened his address with a description of the infinite minuteness of the atom. "If a tiny hole were made in the side of an evacuated electric light bulb," he said, "so that the molecules of air could pass in at a rate of 1,000,000 a second, it would take 100,000,000 years before the bulb was full, and there are two atoms in each molecule of air."

Dr. Aston told how Professor Rutherford had discovered that all atoms were simply different combinations of electricity. The positive particles were cemented together by the negative particles. Tables, houses, chairs, motor cars—in fact all animate and inanimate substances including man himself—were composed simply of electricity.

"What we know of a lump of gold," the speaker declared, "is simply an incomprehensibly large number of electrical particles clustering together. If these particles could be liberated and controlled, they would provide vastly more power than would be needed to run all the machinery that man uses."

"Professor Rutherford," said Dr. Aston, "succeeded in arranging a collision between the central portions of two atoms. The result was the transmutation of the two atoms into entirely different forms of matter."

"The possibility of such transmutation on any scale is of enormous importance. If the amount of hydrogen which goes to constitute a tablespoonful of water were transmuted into helium the energy liberated would be 200,000 kilowatt hours—one seventh of the total amount of electricity used in London in a day for lighting and power purposes."

"The possibility has been discussed," said Dr. Aston, "that this energy, when first liberated, would be out of human control in that case, if all the hydrogen on earth were detonated into space, the successful experiment would be published throughout the entire universe as the birth of a new star. The probability of this catastrophe," added Dr. Aston, "is practically negligible."

He was asked how many grains of corn there would be in any one of 64 boxes, with one in the first, two in the second, four in the third, eight in the fourth and so on in succession. He gave the answers for the fourteenth (8,192), for the eighteenth (131,072) and the twenty-fourth (8,388,608) instantaneously, and he gave the figures for the forty-eighth box (140,737,488,355,328) in six seconds.

Further, on the request to give the total in all the boxes up to and including the sixty-fourth he furnished the correct answer as (18,446,744,073,709,551,615) in 45 seconds—Scientific American.

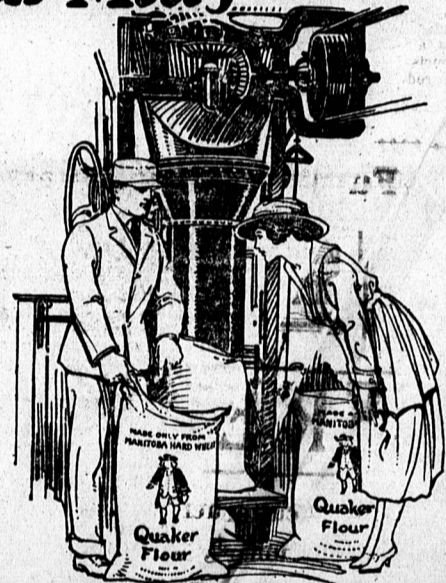
