NORTH AMERICAN LIFE
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A Country Garden

"Spring comes to flower in secret or at night. In vain to pry or eavesdrop, none has yet surprised the break of life."

Watched the rumpiling out of the packed leaf. The little momentous things that earth achieve. While no one is about."

Today the leaves are out on the maple and beech trees, and all good farmers know it is time to sow the seed.

The following are busy sowing seeds of many plants and even now the early sown are up and doing well. I have some new annuals this year and am looking forward to seeing them in bloom.

New varieties of Zinnia, the dwarf pom pom in pastel colors. New Asters, Giant California Sunbines, and Princess Bonnie Flash Marigold, Scarlet Glow, and Cupid, Phacelia gentian bluebell, six inches in height, suitable for the rock garden. Brouillia Sapphire, and the Purple Robe Nierembergia.

A new day lily Ophir has been planted, and these lilies are one of the finest of perennials, they now come in many new colors and bloom over a very long period. They are free from pests and are very hardy, and in a year or so you can divide your clumps into several divisions and this is a fine way to get a collection of them.

Last Fall I cut down a twenty-year-old honeysuckle hedge and I was a bit fearful of the result, but now it is growing out so green and nice that I am very glad that I did give it such a drastic pruning. There is no standing still in the garden, such growth every year changes so many plants and shrubs that sometime they block beautiful views and you are not aware of it for some time.

Looking over my garden diaries I find that this is an early season. Our very best cherry tree is in blossom earlier than the last year. The black sweet cherry, I do hope the frost does not get it. Everything in the garden is growing very fast, including the grass which must be cut often.

This year the tulip may be in blossom earlier than the last number of years, when the first week in June they were at their best. If the weather is kind they usually last for a long time, but the lovely Forget-me-not is good for weeks, and when the apple blossoms are here we wish the days were longer so we might enjoy the fragrance and beauty every moment.

I have Marjorie Borneu tulips planted around the bird-bath and Inglescombe yellow in groups in the border, Clara Butt, an old rose and Advance, a late Crimson Cottage tulip. All of these look well with Forget-me-not.

I have grown many varieties the last few years and among the best are Golden Harvest, Picotee white with rose margins, Baccus plum purple, Golden Bronze Louis XIV, Zinnaburg pure white, Mr. Van Zyl, a soft rose pink and many others. These are all late varieties. Darwin Cottage and Breeder tulips. I wish that we could still buy them for two cents a bulb instead of eight or ten, but I suppose that will never happen again.

Some hybrid tea roses were planted today. They should have been planted several weeks ago, but I heeded them after opening the parcel and watered well, then in the planting I filled the soil up around and will leave it there until I see some new growth, if I do, as they certainly do not look too good. Tailsman, Lady Silvia, Biarritz, Grusz en Tepitz, Etolle De Hollande, a very fragrant crimson, and Betty Uphrad, a salmon pink. Countess Vandal with very long buds, are splendid hybrid tea roses. Then in the hardy shrub roses, Agnes, a Canadian origin, is the very best for our climate, a pale yellow fragrant rose.

The roses Austrian Copper and Austrian yellow, have fine foliage and beautifully colored blooms. The Grootendorst hybrid rugosa bloom all summer with larger trusses of pink and they also come in red but they do not have any fragrance, and I like a rose to have fragrance as Shakespeare has said: "The Rose looks fair but fairer it we deem For that sweet odour which doth in it live."

The emerald is a species of berry.
