IN MEMORIAM

MRS. SUSAN PARSONS

A very old lady in the person of Mrs. Susan Parsons, died Tuesday at her home at Hermonville. It was somewhat difficult to ascertain her exact age, but it was thought she was 99 years of age. She was sick in bed only three or four days, and had been working around the house the previous week, even doing her washing. She was visited in her illness by her pastor, Rev. Father McPherson, and consoled by the sacraments of the Holy Catholic Church. She was buried at St. Margaret's on Wednesday afternoon, the services at the church and at the grave being performed by the pastor of the Church. Her friends and relatives were around her and in affectionate attendance during her last sickness and at her death. Her funeral was large and representative. The deceased was a daughter of the late Captain Stokerson and lived in Souris in her early life, though born at Murray River. At the age of 21 she married Mr. Parsons and resided in Rustico for many years where she reared a family of four, two of whom are living. Mrs. Gallant, St. Charles, and Joseph, at Hermonville, with whom she lived.

She spent a number of years on the Pacific coast, residing mostly at Seattle, Wash. After returning from the coast she acted as housekeeper on the island for several gentlemen—for the late Mr. Archibald McLean, Souris, and late Mr. F. McPherson, Harmory, Jct. In the last six or seven years, growing old, she lived with her son at home. One sister, Mrs. White, died at Murray River, last winter.

She had been in poor health for some time but nothing serious was expected until a few days before her death. Service in the church and at the grave being conducted by her pastor Rev. Mr. Gillis, of Indian River who attended her in her last hours and administered to her the last rites of the Roman Catholic Church which she was a devoted member. The pall-bearers were John W. Brennan, Robert Glover, Jerry Hynes, Michael Brennan, Cornelius Morrison and Bernard McKinnon, James, of Cardigan. May her soul rest in peace.

U. N. B. STUDENT MAY LOSE SIGHT OF LEFT EYE

FREDERICTON, N. B., May 20.—Howard G. Rogers, of Woodstock, son of Mr. and Mrs. H. W. Rogers and a member of the graduating class of 1924 of the University of New Brunswick, was seriously injured last week through the premature explosion of a charge which was loading into an old muzzle-loading cannon used for firing the time honored mortar salutes. Standing almost directly in front of the muzzle-loader he received practically the whole blast with the result that today he is a patient at the Victoria Hospital with his left hand broken and the arm also believed to be fractured, while the left side of his face is badly torn and serious injuries to the left eye are also feared. He may lose the sight of that eye.

Rogers had received his B.Sc. degree in civil engineering the day before and also won the Ketchum silver medal for highest standing in fourth year civil engineering. He has been a regular forward with the University football team for three years.

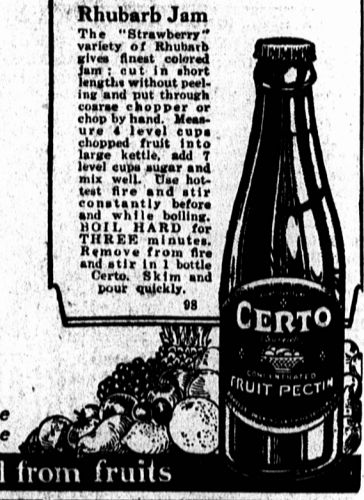
Recipes

Pineapple Jam
Put fruit through food chopper or chop very fine. Measure 4 level cups chopped fruit into large kettle, add 7/8 level cups sugar and mix well. Use hottest fire and stir constantly before and while boiling. BOIL HARD for ONE minute, remove from fire and stir in 1/2 bottle Certo. Skim and pour quickly.

Put ripe fruit through food chopper or chop very fine. To 4 cups chopped fruit add 1/2 cup water. Stir until boiling, cover pan and simmer 5 minutes. Place fruit in jelly bag and strain out juice.
