### WILL ACCIDENT AFFECT DEFENCE STAR?

Boston Fans Speculating On Outcome Of Ward Accident In Regards To Shore.

By Bill King, Associated Press Sports Writer (By Guardian's Special Wire) BOSTON, Jan. 23.—Thanked that Jimmy Ward's injury was not as serious as was first feared, Boston hockey fans today wondered just what effect the accident would have on Eddie Shore, the Bruins' great sparkplug. Ward, veteran right-winger for Montreal Maroons, was scheduled to return home tonight after receiving hospital treatment for the concussion he suffered when felled by one of Shore's rugged body checks in last night's game here. The Montreal player dropped almost on the same spot where Ward "Ace" Bailey of Toronto Leafs, collided with Shore a year ago and received the fractured skull that ended his hockey career. The first inspection of Ward revealed a severe concussion but Dr. Martin Crotty, the Bruins' physician, found no sign of a fracture when the player was X-rayed today. The physician approved Ward's immediate return to Montreal and predicted he would be able to resume play in a week or 10 days. Shore, decidedly high-strung, was on the verge of a nervous breakdown after the Bailey incident. For weeks his sleep was haunted by its memory and even after a long lay-off, this outstanding defenseman was unable to regain his usual form. Since the Bruins go as Shore goes, any relapse he suffers from the Ward accident will be disastrous to the club. Shore has to be at his best to balance the Bruins' defensive force and much of the credit for Boston's 4-3 victory over the Maroons was due to his sensational work.

### Mighty Struggles Expected Before Winners Declared

In the meantime sport fans should make arrangements for next Wednesday evening when the second game of the playoff series will be held. A full house with plenty of vocal encouragement will go a long way to put the spirit of combat into our team. ### Seeking British Backer For Proposed Ocean Race; Royal Ocean Club Likely

LONDON, Jan. 23.—Sponsored by Canadian High Commissioner Howard G. Ferguson, a group of amateur yachtsmen here are seeking a British backer and cash prizes for the proposed 3,000 mile trans-Atlantic race between the Bluenose and Gertrude. The United States and Canadian and United States fishing schooners. The proposed sailing duel, which would be one of the features of the King's jubilee celebrations, drew nearer a reality when it became known today the Royal Ocean Racing Club might sponsor the race. The Bluenose's skipper, Capt. Angus Walters, already has said he is willing to pit his boat, holder of the International Fishermen's Trophy, against her United States rival in a race across the ocean and Capt. Ben Pine of the Gertrude L. Theban, is willing to accept the challenge. If the necessary financial backing can be arranged and the race is staged, the two schooners would spend five months "beam-to-beam" through British ports and perhaps race back to stage a real official battle for the cup the Bluenose has held for 13 years. If the latter race is held this year it will be the first time in more than three years that the Canadian and United States boats have matched their sailing skill. In the fall of 1931 off Halifax, Bluenose took two straight from her rival.

He said Ward planned to leave the hospital today.
