The annual convention of the Church of Christ-Disciples for Prince Edward Island, meeting at Murray Harbor, Aug. 1st to 4th, was opened on Thursday evening at 7:30 with a good attendance of delegates for the Missionary Society business which precedes the convention.

The President, Lt.-Col. C. L. McKay, who left a few days previously to attend the conference of the All Canada Committee at Toronto and then proceeded to New York where he embarked for England to attend the World Convention of the Churches of Christ at Leicester, and had delegated his responsibilities to other brethren, was keenly missed, for Leonard, as he is familiarly known, is perhaps the best informed member of the brotherhood in its convention work, having been President for the past eight years, and having been in close association with the leaders of the missionary forces in Canada and United States for years past.

YACHT PARTY BELIEVED IN HIDING

Wide Search For Five Persons Missing Two Weeks From Mont Louis, Gaspe. (C. P. By Guardian's Special Wire) QUEBEC, Aug. 5.—Belief that five persons missing since they set out for a cruise on the Gulf of St. Lawrence from Mont Louis, Gaspe, two weeks ago in their motor yacht had landed somewhere was expressed here tonight by officials of the Quebec Provincial Police.

Police announced today that James Walters, one of the missing persons, was on bail of \$25,000 to appear at Gaspe fall assessments on a charge of wounding an officer of the Quebec Liquor Commission. Others missing are Mrs. White, alias Walters, Norman Cleary, an electrician at the Mont Louis Lumber Company, and two mechanics, Bert Lachasse and Charles Dionne thought to be Nova Scotians. Police said they believe Walters was in hiding but the other four persons had no connection with the charge.

It was believed the five, for whom a broad search has been going on since they set out from Mont Louis, July 19 in the boat, the Amber Jack, had landed either on the Coast of Labrador, in Newfoundland or in the French islands of St. Pierre, Miquelon.

According to information received by police, Walters had loaded several extra containers of gasoline aboard the boat before the party set out on what they said would be a short trip. This had led to the belief they planned a long trip. CHURCH PAPERS Urge Withdrawal From Olympics (By Alan Gould (Associated Press Sports Editor) NEW YORK, Aug. 5.—On the heels of the latest demands by Jewish organizations that the United States withdraw its support from the 1936 Olympic Games in Berlin, two church publications—one Protestant and the other Catholic—today called editorially for equally drastic action.

The Commonwealth, a Catholic weekly, in effect urged a boycott of the Olympics by all Catholics. The Christian Century, a Protestant magazine, declared fair play could not be expected in Germany and recommended the transfer of the international athletic meet to some other country.

The effect of these developments was to broaden the scope of criticism directed at Germany and based upon allegations of religious as well as racial discrimination in German athletics. Previously anti-Nazi feeling, insofar as the Olympics are concerned, has largely been confined to Jewish elements.

The Commonwealth traces, in detail, a sequence of events calculated to show prejudice, discrimination and even violence against the athletic youth organization of German Catholics despite assurances from Reichsfuehrer Hitler and protests from the Vatican. Frequent attempts have been made, the editorial charges, to disband the Deutsche Jugendkraft, organized in 1920 to foster the athletic work of young German Catholics and numbering nearly 1,000,000 members in 1932.
