### TO AID DEPENDENT PEOPLE.

LAKE MOHONK, N. Y., Oct. 22.—The thirty-first annual meeting of the Lake Mohonk Conference of Friends of the Indian and other Dependent People assembled today with a large attendance of philanthropists, educators, public officials and others interested in the welfare of the Indians, Filipinos and other people over whom the United States Government has been placed in a position of guardianship. The sessions will continue to and including Friday evening and will be presided over by Dr. Elmer E. Brown, chancellor of New York University. The Philippines discussions will deal with questions of administration the independence issue raised by the Jones bill, and the treatment of the Moros and other pagan tribes of the island. The discussions relating to the American Indians will embrace a comprehensive inquiry into conditions among the so-called "Five Civilized Tribes" of Oklahoma, revealed last winter while Congress was devoting attention to the subject. Particular attention will be paid to the protection of the Indians from ruthless exploitation.

PEACE RIVER LINE. EDMONTON, Alta., Oct. 21.—One hundred miles of new railway will be constructed in Peace River by the Central Canada railway company in the form of a branch line to the Edmonton-Dunvegan and British Columbia railway. The line will run from the E. D. and B. C. line to Peace River Crossing and thence in a generally westerly direction to a point in township 81, range 4, west of the sixth meridian, a total distance of 100 miles the line being guaranteed to the extent of \$20,000 per mile. At least 50 miles is to be constructed before December 31, 1914, and the line completed and ready for traffic before December 31, 1917. Specifications are to be the same as those of the Edmonton-Dunvegan and British Columbia railway.

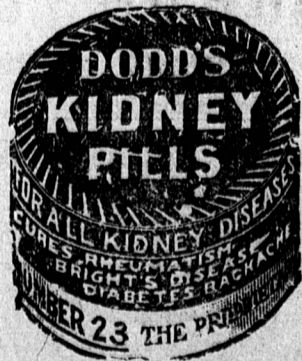
TOO MUCH HASTE IS BELIEF OF EXPERTS

WASHINGTON, D. C., Oct. 21.—Army and navy aviation experts here are convinced that to-day's accident will not retard development of the dirigible as an instrument of warfare, Brigadier General Scriven, in charge of army aeronautics, stands

by his recommendations to Congress for the acquisition of at least two such war craft. He has stated to Congress committees that such dirigibles would be of immense service in the defence of the Panama Canal and that without them it would be comparatively easy for an enemy equipped to drop destructive charges into the locks and dams.

### OBSTRUCTION NAVIGATION ON RIVER.

DIGBY, October 21.—Navigation on the Bear River is practically halted and will be for some days. This obstruction is a matter that really cannot be helped, for it has been found necessary to close the draw of the wooden bridge while the draw of the new steel railway bridge is being placed in position. Several vessels are due to load lumber at the wharves four miles up the river but Powers and Brewer, the contractors, have agreed to bear all expenses incurred in lightening the cargoes down river, and across the basin to Digby for shipment. The steamer Bear River, bound to St. John, was held up there tonight and before getting under the bridge at dead low water had to cut several feet of her spars. The Norwegian steamer Theims, four days from Jacksonville, with hard pine and creosote piling for Powers and Brewer, arrived tonight.
