OTTAWA, July 5.—Citizens which have hitherto been giving wholehearted support to the Progressive party comments this morning upon Mr. Crea's quite obvious desire to link the party up with the Liberals and Premier Drury's frank declaration in favor of something like fusion in Ontario the political leaders. The Citizen believe sincerely that they can best serve by being in office they are no different from other party leaders in this respect but seeing no immediate prospect of attaching office by the usual path of conducting an independent progressive opinion in the country sufficiently strong the effect the Progressives to power the easiest way would naturally seem to be to make an alliance with the Liberals.

ALBERTA, SEED IN DEMAND

CALGARY, July 5.—The demand Alberta grown wheat, oats and barley for seed has grown to such dimensions that special provision is being made for the handling of it. Co-operation between the Provincial Department of Seed Branch has been established. Field inspection will be carried on by the government supervision and the threshed grain will be graded by the Dominion Seed Branch. Arrangements are to be made whereby central cleaning facilities will be established, and selected exhibits of Alberta seeds will be displayed at state fairs of the principal central and western states.
