**Hanging Pictures**

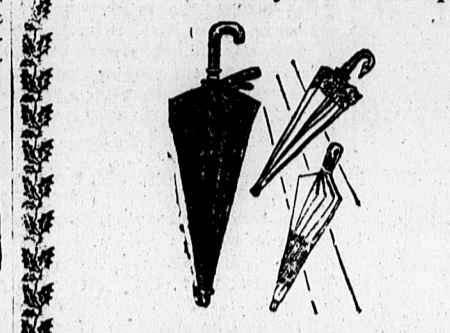
**Patriotic Legislation**

compelling all resident or visiting aliens to register with due ceremony in the Superior Court.

But there are many more amusing laws, even if less annoying. In Delaware an alien is not permitted to catch lobsters; in Oregon he may not take salmon of oysters. In Pennsylvania an alien seen in the open with a dog which might possibly be used for hunting is guilty of violating the state laws which restrict that privilege to citizens. In West Virginia an alien may not own a dog for any purpose. He might "set the bulldog upon an American burglar," comments Mr. Seagle.

New Jersey will not permit an alien to become a detective. Washington will not let him hold a mortgage on land. New York will not issue a permit to a blind person to beg on the streets. Oregon prohibits aliens from being pawnbrokers and from conducting pool-parlors, card-rooms or dance halls. Twenty-two states have stringent regulations covering parochial and foreign language schools, and Indiana and Ohio still refuse to permit the teaching of German. Many states have legislated on the nature of text-books to be used in the schools

particularly in the matter of the Revolution and the War of 1812. Flags must be flown and national hymns sung at prescribed periods. The flag is protected with great zeal, and in New York it is a crime to "paw or raffle" the Stars and Stripes. Minnesota and Michigan make it a crime to dance to the music of the Star-Spangled Banner.

But the author saves Indiana and Illinois for his final instances of super-patriotism. The Illinois legislature, perhaps inspired by the celebrated "Big Bill" Thompson, mayor of Chicago, solemnly passed an act declaring that the "Official language of the State of Illinois shall be known hereafter as "The American Language." And Indiana, not to be out-done, finding that "this noble bird" the American eagle was fast becoming extinct decreed that it should be illegal to "kill, capture injure or molest" that excellent biped or "to take, injure, destroy or molest; its nest or eggs."
