INCREASED ENROLLMENT - Summerside schools opened on Tuesday with an increased enrollment over last year. The Summerside High School and Academy have 810 pupils registered up to and including grade twelve. Of this number 62 are in grades eleven and twelve. The total enrollment shows an increase of about 50 over last year. St. Mary's Academy has 540 students entered which is up to grade ten and includes 29 in the commercial course. This is an increase of 20 over last year. St. Mary's Academy up to grade ten but boys are accepted only up to grade four.

INJURED IN ACCIDENT - Carl Ford of Mount Pleasant is a patient in the Prince County Hospital with what are believed to be minor injuries following a motor accident that occurred about 7:30 last evening on the main highway about one mile west of the coupe. West Prince County and exhibitors bring entries from the extreme ends of it, clearly showing how highly it is valued.

Civic Welcome
A civic welcome was tendered by His Worship Mayor Charles Profit and he expressed the hope that all would enjoy themselves to the fullest extent.

Premier J. Walter Jones in his opening remarks stated that the progress made in the Alberton Exhibition is beyond anything he had ever seen. Referring to the improved methods of farming in vogue today and noting the large number of cars he present he said that as cars increase the number of horses on the farm decreases and thus the habits of farming change. Mechanized methods of farming have made it possible to finish harvesting much earlier in the season and at a date that would have been impossible ten or fifteen years ago.

Senator G. H. Barbour in his brief address complimented the executive highly for the splendid success they had made of this year's show.

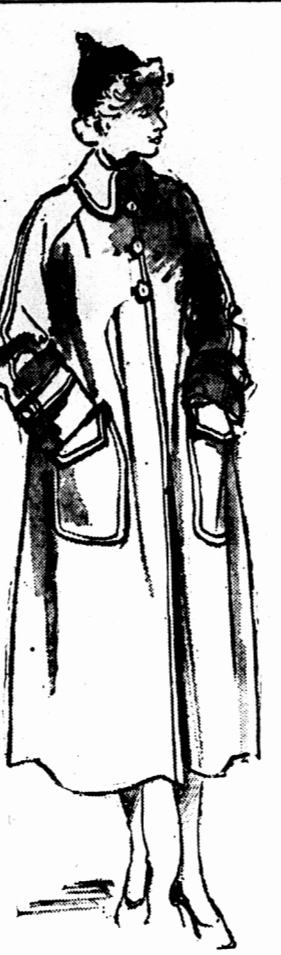
Farmers he said must be able to watch and judge the market and change from one type of farming to another as conditions demand. Exhibitions help, he continued, to improve the quality of the farmers' produce and his stock, he said. Senator Barbour recalled that fifty years ago produce was shipped in large quantities from Alberton by boat but all that has present changed and he hoped that it was not far distant when it would be possible to once again have this service.

The gathering was also addressed by Brig. John Price who assured all that he felt deeply honored by the invitation to be present on this occasion.

High Quality Exhibits

In the livestock exhibits yesterday the number of entries in most classes were about the same as last year.

According to Mr. O'Brien, the President of the Exhibition the number of horses exhibited this year was somewhat lower than last but he believed that the quality was much better. All classes of dairy cattle were well filled with the exception of the Herefords. Mr. George MacMillan, who
