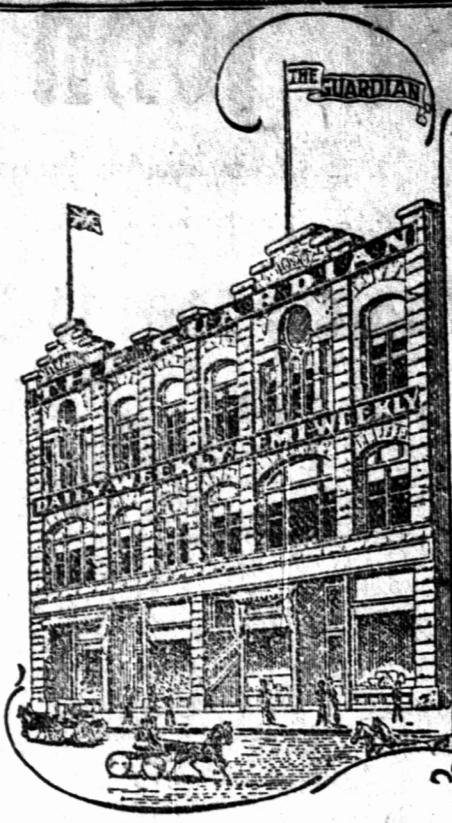

We extend congratulation to Messrs Haszard and Higgs, and we feel assured that the Maritime Board of Trade could not have chosen better men for their respective positions.

The automobile is proving a busy and useful conveyance. It has been handled with care, both as to the safety of its passengers and in the matter of causing the least fright to teams. Most city horses now take it as a matter of course. It goes and comes making from twelve to fifteen trips daily around the loop line to the Park and return. Citizens and tourists alike patronize it liberally and our country cousins who come to the city do not think their visit quits complete without a ride on the auto. With its growing popularity the owners are, we believe likely to be rewarded with a fair return for their investment.

No sufficient reason or explanation has been offered for the action of the Belgian Government in forbidding the Boer generals to enter that kingdom.

Parents are reminded that on the re-opening of the schools on September 2nd no children are to be admitted who have not been vaccinated. There is a general and proper determination throughout Canada to enforce vaccination more zealously than heretofore and so prevent the recurring and sadly fatal epidemics of smallpox which have been frequent in recent years.

An Ottawa despatch tells that yesterday was Mr. E. B. Eddy's birthday. Added interest was lent to the occasion from the fact that on that day the corner-stone of the new office building being erected on the site of the temporary structure built after the fire was laid with appropriate ceremony. Mr. Eddy was born on his father's farm, near Bristol, Vt. on August 22 1827, and is accordingly in his 75th year. Despite advancing years, he still takes a keen interest in the affairs of his business, and is thoroughly conversant with its details.

Under the caption, **The Tariff Should not be Increased**, the Winnipeg Free Press points out that the export of Canadian manufactures has increased under the present tariff from \$9,365,884 in 1896 to \$16,012,208 in 1901. This tells its own story. Our exported manufactures have to meet in the open market the competition of all the world, and if they are able to hold their own there it cannot be reasonably claimed that they need more than the liberal protection now accorded them at home. Speaking for Western Liberals the Free Press says "they are sold to the last man in their hostility to any such capitalization of the historic fortress of Liberalism; and we shall be surprised beyond measure if the Eastern Liberals do not show an equal loyalty to the traditional policy of the party."

The imports and exports of the Australian Colonies are upon a scale considerably smaller than we have attained in the Dominion. In a report to the Department of Trade and Commerce, dated July 15th, Mr. J. S. Lake, commercial agent for Canada in Australia, gives the statistics of Australian trade for the year 1901, the figures being as follows:—

The fourth of July having been recognized for over a century and a quarter as the day of the signing of the famous Declaration of Independence, is not likely to lose its place as a red letter day in the American calendar. And yet very strong evidence is offered that the signing did not take place on July 4, 1776, but on August 2 following. It appears from a letter of Elbridge Gerry, of gerrymander fame, that on the 21st of July, 1776, he was at King's bridge, and in this communication, addressed to John Adams, asked him to sign the Declaration for him as soon as the document was ready and an American seal prepared. This is documentary evidence that on 21st July the Declaration had not been signed, and for her evidence of a pretty conclusive kind is offered that the actual signing was on August 2. Not that it makes much difference. The Declaration is on record and has never been authoritatively annulled.
