

Prince Edward Island's Greatest Speed Carnival

At Provincial Exhibition, Charlottetown, August 18th to 21st — Four Days Racing.

What promises to be the greatest carnival of speed ever presented to the public of Prince Edward Island will be at the Provincial Exhibition, Charlottetown, August 18th to 21st. There is no doubt that the greatest number of entries that has ever graced a Maritime Province meeting will be on hand when the starter's bell taps on Tuesday, August 18th.

The program will consist of three races each day of the four days and is made to bring together the very best of the speed brigade. Provision has been made to cater to the medium class horses as well, so that every horse owner in the Maritime Provinces will have a chance to take away some of the prize money.

The Free For All Trot and Pace is expected to bring together Trans-Atlantic, 2.02 1-2, Janette Royal, 2.04 1-4, Ruby P., 2.06 1-2, Volo Rico, 2.04 and other stars. The 2.14 Class Trot will likely have as entries Abbe Worthy, Johnny Miles 2.11 1-4, Chestnut Dillon 2.08 3-4, Peter Dawes 2.12 1-4 and other notable trotters.

The other classes are so arranged as to divide up trotters and pacers into such divisions as will insure close contests and thrilling finishes. A three year old trot and pace which last year provided unexpected excitement, should this year again prove a good drawing card.

The special prizes in gold for grooms and drivers have been one of the popular features of our Exhibition races and are again continued. Mayor T. W. L. Prowse has also offered for competition a valuable trophy to be presented to the driver scoring the most points during the meeting.

The greatest interest is being taken in this Exhibition race program all over the Maritimes and nearly 100 requests have been received for it from horse owners. Today it is being mailed and no doubt when the entries close on July 25th there will be a wonderful response.

The race track is being carefully looked after this year by James Harper and an assistant, and never was in better condition. It will be kept fairly well until the week preceding Exhibition when a fast surface will be prepared that should result in record breaking miles. It will be remembered that the track trotting record is 2.11 1-4 made by Bill Sharen in 1920. The track pacing record is 2.08 1-4 made by John R. Braden in 1921. It will not be surprising if both these records fall.

The order of the program will be made so that if possible each horse can start in two races.

SPECIAL PRIZES FOR DRIVERS AND OWNERS

A special ribbon will be given to the owner of the winning horse in each race, and \$200.00 in Gold to the driver winning the most points during the meeting, \$100.00 in Gold to the driver winning second most points during the meet. First place counts five points, second place three points, third place two points and fourth place one point. \$100.00 in Gold will be given to the winning driver in each race. The Mayor T. W. L. Prowse cup will be awarded to the driver scoring most points during the meet.

A \$100.00 Gold piece will be given to the driver driving the fastest heat trotted during the meet and a \$100.00 Gold piece to the driver driving the fastest heat paced during the meet.

Ten Dollars in Gold will be given to the caretaker of the horse trotting the fastest heat and Ten Dollars in Gold to the caretaker of the horse pacing the fastest heat.

Five Dollars in Gold will be given to the caretaker of each horse winning a race in the trotting and pacing classes during the meet.

Fifty Dollars in Gold will be given to the owner of the horse that beats 2:10 pacing during the meet, except as provided for below. Fifty Dollars in Gold to the owner of the horse that beats the track trotting record of 2:11 1-4 during the meeting, except as provided for below. In case two horses beat the above records then the awards go to the fastest horse. If two horses tie for the awards the money will be divided equally.

SPECIAL CONDITIONS GOVERNING EVENTS NO. 6 AND NO. 11

Horses excepting three year olds with records 2:16 1/4 or better in No. 6 and 2:15 1/4 or better in No. 11, will be automatically transferred to Class No. 5 and Class No. 10, respectively.

Class No. 12. Three Year Old Trot and Pace. Any trotter or pacer taking a record of 2:16 1/4 or better previous to the racing of this event will be transferred to Class No. 6 if Maritime bred trotter, or Class No. 5, if not Maritime bred trotter, or if pacer to Class No. 11.

GENERAL CONDITIONS

The Charlottetown Race Track was entirely resurfaced the fall of 1929 and last year was improved after inspection and by direction of J. S. Coates, Goshen, New York, foremost track authority in America. It is now one of the fastest, best laid out and best cared for tracks, and surely the most beautifully situated of any in the Maritime Provinces. A great deal of effort will be made to keep it in apple pie order all through the period before the races and during the races so that no horse will become unsound or suffer injury and to enable them to make fast time.

Horsemen by wiring at our expense notifying us of their arrival will be met at train and their baggage transferred to the grounds without cost to them, also taken away without cost to them. Every effort will be made to make the Horsemen's stay pleasant and send them away feeling that they have been well treated.

All races to be raced on three heat plan; 10% of each purse will be awarded to the winner. The remainder will be divided into three equal parts, one part to be raced for each heat. In the event of there being three heat winners they shall race a fourth heat to determine the winner of the event.

All purses divided 50, 25, 15 and 10. Entry fee 5%. Five per cent of the money raced for each heat will be deducted from the first and second horses, 4% will be deducted from the third horse and 3% from the fourth horse.

Six horses to enter, four to start. Right reserved to change program, reject any Entry, bar any driver, and to declare race off on account of bad weather, or failing to obtain a satisfactory number of entries or starters to transfer horses to another class to which they are eligible, reopen or substitute another class without re-advertising, and alter or extend racing dates.

Additional entries of an individual ownership may be made in any class by the payment of 1% on closing date, but entries of separate ownership, although in the same stable must pay installments in full.

Two entries of the same ownership may start in the same race, providing the full 5% is paid on each starter, the drivers having the approval of the Judges.

All horses with names of drivers must be declared in by 11 o'clock a. m., the day prior to the race.

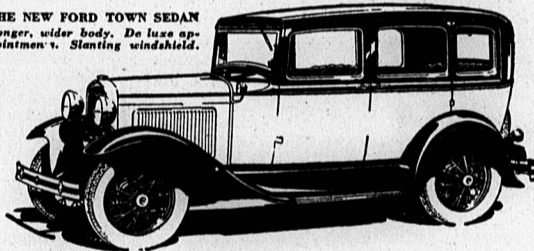
In his capacity of Assistant Commissioner, Mr. Stiles visited the Province last year, and this will be his first visit as executive head of the Boy Scout movement in Canada.
