A RAYMOND and Whitcomb party numbering 48 persons arrived by the S. S. Northumberland on Saturday night from Pictou, and put up at the Victoria. They leave this morning for Summerside and the mainland.

The S. S. City of London carried 75 passengers and two large loads of freight to Crapaud on Saturday. The return cargo consisted of 125 cases lobsters, 60 cases eggs, 35 boxes produce, 6 trunks, 1 horse and wagon, 1 cow, 2 sacks wool and two tons iron and rope.

The funeral of the late John Harper took place yesterday afternoon and was largely attended by friends and citizens. The Loyal Orange Lodge and two Courts of Independent Order of Foresters marched in procession, and conducted the services at the grave.

THOSE who witnessed the tournament on Belvidere links recently, between St. John and Charlottetown may be interested to know that the Halifax golf players defeated St. John on Friday on the Golf Club Links at Halifax by 37 holes up, but two of the St. John men out of 13 playing scoring over Halifax.

YESTERDAY afternoon during the sudden squall which occurred, a sail boat was upset in the harbor, near Roselank, opposite the City. As the boat was not ballasted it did not sink. The occupants scrambled on to the bottom, and remained there till rescued. The boat was taken ashore and righted and sailed into dock.

HON. WILLIAM TEMPLEMAN, Minister of Inland Revenue, arrived on Saturday night from Sydney. The Minister leaves this morning for Moncton. He has been accompanied on the present tour by W. McKinnon of Ottawa. Hon. Mr. Templeman visited the Island about thirty years ago. He expressed himself as delighted with the appearance of the Province at the present time.

THE boat race, arranged for Saturday afternoon in Charlottetown Harbor came off as announced. Five lobster boats entered: Example Capt. Jardine, Pownah, Dreadnought, Capt. Cornfoot, City; Pigeon, Capt. Chan, Moore, City; Phantom, Capt. Whalen, City; and another boat sailed by Capt. Hewson St. Peter's Island. The race was over the usual 15 miles course and was sailed in fast time the leading boat winning in 2 hours 4 minutes. The boats came in as follows: Example, Dreadnought, Pigeon, and Capt. Hewson's boat fourth. The Phantom broke her center board in the second round and had to withdraw. The prize is a silver watch to be awarded to the boat winning best three races out of five. These races are got up by the boatmen, and the interested public should try to encourage this healthy and interesting sport by donating prizes for the contestants.
