SMUGGLED CHINESE THROUGH FROM CANADA
 WATERTOWN, N. Y., June 24.—Lee Sam, or Lee Woo, on trial here all last week for violating the immigration laws in smuggling Chinese into this country from Canada pleaded guilty this afternoon after all the evidence had been submitted in the Federal Court. He will be sentenced later in the week. Sam maintained a regular agency in New York. Judge Clark former proprietor of a hotel confessed to having assisted Chinamen into the country from Canada, testifying that he received \$100 a head for the celestials. He said that from July 1912 to May 1913, he made it a business to go regularly to Toronto, take Chinamen by rail to Prescott, Ont., or Brockville, Ont., and then bring them across the St. Lawrence in a boat by night, walk them as far as possible, hiding them in the woods when day dawned.



BIGGEST FAILURE IN HISTORY OF UNITED STATES.
 NEW YORK, June 25.—The biggest mercantile failure in the history of the United States was precipitated today, when receivers were appointed for the H. B. Claflin Company of this city. The company, it is estimated, owes more than \$30,000,000, which, at the present time, it is unable to pay. Its assets are said to be \$14,000,000.

HERO OF THE COLUMBIAN WRECK LOSES BOTH FEET
 Halifax, June 25.—Both feet were amputated today of Chief Officer Robert Tirre, the hero of the third boat picked up from the steamer Columbian, which was burned at sea on May 2nd, and who has been at the Victoria General Hospital since his arrival in Halifax.
 Every effort had been made to save his feet but to no avail. He stood the operation well and is expected to recover.
 Oscar Kendall, a seaman, who was in the same boat, was released today and sent to his home in the United States.
