NOTICE

The attention of citizens is directed to the following sections of the By-Laws of the Town of Summerside respecting private street crossings, etc.:

Every owner or occupier of any house, building or lot within the Town, who shall require to drive any horse or other animal, or wagon or other vehicle, across any sidewalk for the purpose of entering his house or premises, shall construct and maintain across the drain, gutter or water course opposite the gateway or entrance to his premises, a good and sufficient bridge of sound plank, brick, stone, or tile, so constructed and maintained as to satisfy the Town Council or a person authorized by them to inspect the same, and to be placed so as not to obstruct the drain or water course in the gutter, and the Street Man is directed to remove all such crossings that are not in conformity with this By-Law.

No person shall dig up or carry away any earth, sods or soil from any Street, road or lane within the Town.

I am instructed to notify the public that the above By-Laws will be strictly enforced.

—Play-going people and others of Alberton and vicinity were accorded a few hours of genuine entertainment on the night of the 13th instant. The sidewalk concert, for some time on the minds of Alberton, materialized and passed off on a high and work accompanied it, success crowned it. Despite threatening weather the Town Hall was well filled by an orderly, eager and expectant audience. Promptly at 8.30 the Alberton Ladies' Band, under the capable direction of Dr. Purdy, opened the entertainment by a choice, well executed orchestral selection which was accorded well merited applause. The curtain was then rung up and "The Witch of Bander" was under way.

Miss Lulu Ross as "The Witch" successfully produced spasms of well simulated terror in the minds of her victims. Herb Clarke and Mrs. H. H. Burke, farmer and wife, showed commercialism in a medieval way by "voking the witch to learn if oil were present. They were accorded terror rather than information by the spirit. Miss Lola Leavitt faithfully pictured the lone maiden lady speaking one to love and be loved. Her consistency achieved well merited success. A. L. Doherty, as the "old back," overcame by his nervousness, boisterous and pretentious approach of the inevitable, only to learn that he who scares himself runs away must later on return and submit to late-Chas. Arsenault successfully showed readiness for fun and his persistent unintentional "butting in" on touch-scenes often threatened dire results.

A. B. Forgythe, affected by a stammer, forcibly demonstrated that in certain situations such an impediment is all but fatal. Miss B. Sullivan faithfully reproduced the poetic domestic, who seeks to overcome mere materialism and to elevate sordid minds from thoughts of dinner to realms beyond the clouds. Between acts her made candy was disposed of by some of the youth and beauty of Alberton while the band discoursed music. Much credit is due to the executive which produced the entertainment, to J. F. White, the efficient director, and to Dr. Purdy and the members of the Female Band, each and all of whom devoted their time, talents and energy in a labor of love for the benefit of their Home Town.

The lines on the Canadian reciprocity agreement were squarely drawn in the senate today when Chairman Penrose of the finance committee, reported the bill without recommendation. Favorable and adverse views were presented by senators, and the way cleared for the long siege of discussion in open session.

Messrs. McCumber and LaFollette submitted reports outlining their individual views in opposition to reciprocity, and Mr. Williams presented the views of himself and Messrs. Stone and Kern favorable to the measure. The debate will begin tomorrow, with speeches in opposition to the bill by Senators Curtis and McCumber.

Mr. Gore introduced an amendment to the bill which would place Canadian flour, meal, meats and agricultural implements on the free list, but said he would not press the provision if it became evident that its adoption would imperil the bill.

LA FOLLETTE AGAINST PACT. Senator LaFollette in an individual report presented a diverse view on the reciprocity bill. He said it was perfectly consistent for one who believed in free trade to support the bill, but no man who believed either a tariff for revenue only, or in a protective tariff could consistently give it his support.

"In the belief that duties should represent the difference in the cost of production at home and abroad, with others I contended," said he, "when the Payne-Aldrich bill was pending, for reductions in duties to that level in so far as the information then was furnished any safe criterion to determine rates upon that principle."

"I shall continue to advocate tariff legislation based upon that principle. I believe in reciprocity with Canada. The mutual give and take of tariff concessions between our country and our world neighbors along the lines laid down by Blaine and McKinley, is a policy that has in view the best welfare of all concerned."

"But I protest against this proposed revision of our tariff by executive mandate. I protest against this diplomatic bargain that is masquerading in the guise of reciprocity. It is not reciprocity, it is not a fair exchange of tariff advantages between our citizens and the citizens of Canada. It is tariff trade, conceived in special interest selfishness, negotiated in secret and brought in to the open with the attractive label of reciprocity as a bid for the favor of the American public—a people who believe sincerely in reciprocity that is genuine."

"This agreement is not in the interest of the consumer. Relief from the high cost of living is not to be found in such a tariff compact as that represented in the pending bill."

In order to benefit the consumers. And it is scarcely less than criminal to make a scapegoat of the farmer for the benefit of any lawful combination.

"It is not the farmer, it is not the consumer for whom these negotiations were made. It was made to benefit the miller, the packer, the newspaper publishers.

"The newspaper publishers are promised a free market for print paper, for which they expend about \$25,000,000 annually. No one who investigates the conditions under which the newspapers of this country have been compelled to purchase their supply of print paper can escape the conclusion that the publishers have been subjected to extortion.

"The conditions under which the publishers are forced to conduct their business are intolerable. The conditions call for action which will afford immediate relief.

"The gross injustice of the proposed bill impels me to oppose it. I recognize no canon of right and fair dealing that would permit me to support it in its present form. If, however, it is to be enacted into law, it should not pass without amendments in the interest of the great body of consumers, including the farmers, who are compelled to bear all the burden of the present tariff pact.

"I purpose to offer amendments providing for a complete revision of the wool and cotton schedules of the present Payne-Aldrich tariff law, revision of the rates on structural iron and steel, certain other paragraphs of that schedule, also amendments revising the sugar schedule. Such a revision downward, while reducing our government revenues less than \$10,000,000 annually will effect a reduction in the cost of living by lowering carry all the burden of the present aggregating more than \$200,000,000 a year."
