The Speech from the throne was read after which Speaker Jardine resumed the chair. The Premier then announced his cabinet as follows: Premier and President of Council, E. B. Williams; Minister of Finance, John Mollison; Minister of Justice, A. C. Saunders; Minister of Railways, Dr. A. A. McLellan; Minister of Agriculture, Capt. Joseph Read; Minister of Public Works, D. K. Currie; Minister of Marine and Fisheries, J. C. Jardine. The draft address was moved by B. W. Tanton seconded by J. C. Jardine after which it was discussed by J. M. Clark, leader of the opposition, Premier Williams, R. H. McDonald, Hon Mr. Mollison and John Dobson, the last named moving the adjournment of the debate till next Friday night at 8.15.

A meeting of the High Standing committee of the L. O. F., was held Friday night in Kensington. Dr. Darrach, High Physician, presided. There was a large attendance and the affair passed off very successfully. The speakers were Horatio Nelson, High Chief Ranger; Rev. David Price, H. V. C. H. Charles Murphy, P. H. C. R., Prof. E. E. Jordan, H. Tress and L. U. Fowler, H. Secretary. The subject "Forestry" was fully and ably discussed. At the close of the meeting refreshments were served, and a pleasant social time was spent.
