An "ex-Pupil of West Kent School," now in Ottawa, writes The Guardian, that there has been recently established at the capital a Cadet Regiment, the object of which is to enlist youths between the ages of 14 and 18, these being old for the public school Cadets and two young boys for the city batteries and regiments. The corps have been uniformed at a cost of about \$3 per man. The regiment is over 300 strong and is officered entirely by youths. A professional school for training them has been established under Serg Major Finley of the 43rd. There is one instructor for each company. A bugle band and a brass band are in course of formation. The Government furnishes rifles, bayonets, belts, etc. The correspondent adds: "We expect to be the crack Cadets of the Dominion by next spring. We also have a bearer corps under command of Serg Riddell of the A.M.C.—Just to let the public schools of Charlottetown know what we are doing here."

The Belle of Richmond was the play put on at the Opera House last evening by the Klark-Urban Company and proved very attractive and pleasing. Notwithstanding the unfavorable weather and the sloppy streets, the attendance was good and everybody appeared to heartily enjoy the play.
