Deceased leaves to mourn four daughters—Mrs. John Gunn, Clifton; Mrs. John Dunning, Alberton; Mrs. Alfred Mayhew, Margate; and Miss Christine of Boston, Mass; besides a large circle of relatives and friends. The pall-bearers were his brother elders Wm. Whitehead, J. Murray, Geo. Found, C. MacGregor, J. A. Campbell and R. MacKay.—Com.

At her home, Caswell Academy, Fishkill on the Hudson, New York, on May 23rd, Annie McLaren, beloved wife of William Kennedy, and daughter of the late John McLaren, New Perth, P. E. Island, passed to the final rest, in the 67th year of her age. Mrs. Kennedy in passing from the present life, leaves to mourn their loss her husband, four sons and three daughters. In comparatively early life Mrs. Kennedy accepted the principles of the Gospel of the Son of God, and ever after, during her entire life, she rendered tender, loving and devoted service to Him, whom she believed gave His life for her redemption; the effects of which service is a beautiful and lasting impression on the lives of those of her own household, besides many others with whom she had come in contact. It is not too much to say that her daily walk and conversation were an example of the pure and good, and to know her well, was a benediction, therefore, those who are left bereaved for the time being "Sorrow not, as those who have no hope." They are assured that with wife, mother, sister and friends, all is well. "Those who sleep in Jesus, God will bring with Him."—Com.
